

THE CLASS OF 2005: FOUR-YEAR LONGITUDINAL GRADUATION AND DROPOUT REPORT AND 2004-2005 EVENT DROPOUT RATES

KEY FINDINGS

Overall, more than one-half (53.2 percent) of students in the Class of 2005 graduated, and 31.6 percent remained enrolled in high school for a fifth year while less than one-fifth (15.2 percent) of the class dropped out at the end of the four years. The 2005 graduation rate is slightly lower than the previous two classes, 2004 (54.3 percent) and 2003 (53.4 percent). Significant numbers of students are remaining enrolled for a fifth year of high school—more so than in previous classes, in part as a consequence of a change in New York State Diploma requirements. The four-year graduation and still-enrolled rates are higher in the Class of 2005 (84.8 percent) as compared with the Class of 2004 (83.7 percent) and the Class of 2003 (79.7 percent). In addition, the 2005 dropout rate decreased by 1.1 percentage points compared with the Class of 2004 (16.3 percent); the 2005 dropout rate is over five percentage points lower than Classes of 2003 (20.3 percent), 2002 (20.3 percent), and 2001 (20.4 percent). This decrease in the dropout rate beginning in 2004 is partially attributable to a change in DOE policy requiring exit interviews with potential dropouts.

Beginning with the Class of 2005, high school seniors may be awarded two levels of Regents diplomas. The combined percentage of graduates awarded Advanced Regents Diplomas (25.2 percent) and Regents Diplomas (35.5 percent) was 60.7 percent for the Class of 2005. Appendix A details changes in diploma requirements for a New York State high school diploma.

BACKGROUND

This report presents the progress towards school completion of students who entered the ninth grade in Fall 2001 and were scheduled to graduate on time in Spring 2005 after four years of high school. The Class of 2005 is the twentieth class for which the Division of Assessment and Accountability (DAA) has conducted a four-year longitudinal study. The report presents outcomes for the class as a whole, as well as outcomes for specific groups of students categorized by gender, native language, race/ethnicity, and immigrant status. Changes in diploma requirements appear in Appendix A. Four-year outcome data for the individual high schools appear in Appendix B. Diploma types by school are presented in Appendix C. Diploma types by racial/ethnic groups are presented in Appendix D. To track trends across classes, comparisons of four-year outcome data for the Classes of 2003, 2004, and 2005 are presented in Appendix E. Event dropout rates appear in Appendix F.

METHODOLOGY

Longitudinal Cohorts

The study follows two student cohorts. One is comprised of students in general education classes, including students receiving special education services in less restrictive settings. This cohort is referred to as the Class of 2005. The other is comprised of students in self-contained special education classes in either regular high schools or in District 75, the citywide special education district which consists of schools that primarily serve students with severe disabling conditions. This cohort is referred to as the Special Education Class of 2005.

Students were assigned to the Class of 2005 based on the year in which they entered Grades 9 through 12. More than nine in ten (90.0 percent) of the students in the Class of 2005 joined the cohort as entering ninth-graders during the 2001-2002 school year and most had been in the New York City public schools in lower grades. Some entered our school system during Grade 9. The remainder transferred into the New York City public schools during high school and became part of the cohort as tenth graders in 2002-03, as eleventh graders in 2003-04, or as twelfth graders in 2004-2005. All of these students would have completed the traditional four-year high school sequence by Spring or Summer 2005. Students who were discharged to other school systems with confirmation of enrollment were omitted from the cohort.

Because self-contained special education classes are ungraded, students were assigned to the separate Special Education Class of 2005 cohort based on their age and enrollment in special education programs. Students were included in the Special Education Class of 2005 if they were 14 years old during the 2001-2002 school year and were in a self-contained special education class in a Community School District school, high school, or a citywide special education program (District 75). Students were not added to the Special Education Class of 2005 after the initial year because of the ungraded nature of their classes.

The primary focus of this report is on the number and percent of students graduating on time and those still enrolled for a fifth year of high school; students dropping out of the New York City public schools are also tracked. Related to this focus is the task of determining the status of all of the students in the class at the time the students were expected to graduate. Each student in the study group is determined to be in one of four possible categories based on his or her status at the end of the school year. *Graduates* are students who have received a high school diploma, GED, or special education certificate by June or August 2005. *Still-enrolled* students were still on register and scheduled to continue into a fifth year of high school in Fall 2005. *Dropouts* are students who have left the school system without enrolling in another education program that leads either to a high school diploma or prepares the student for the Test of General Educational Development leading to a general equivalency diploma (GED). *Discharges* are students who left the school system primarily to enroll in another educational program or setting. Students who aged out of the school system, i.e., reached the age of 21, and students who died prior to completing high school, are also counted in this category.

Event Dropout Rate

In addition to the Class of 2005 longitudinal data, this report also presents event dropout rates. The event dropout rate represents the number of students who dropped out of high school during the 2004-2005 school year, regardless of when they entered the school system. Students are counted as dropouts if they left school by the end of the 2004-2005 school year without re-enrolling in another educational setting leading to a high school diploma or GED. Only students who were first-time dropouts during the 2004-2005 school year are counted.

FINDINGS

Characteristics of the Class of 2005

During the dates covered by the study (the 2001-2002 through the 2004-2005 school years), the New York City public schools served 83,270 students in the cohort (see Table 1). This included the base population of 75,694 students who entered 9th grade in 2001-2002 and 7,576 students admitted to the class in subsequent years.

Over the four-year period, 16,001 (19.2 percent) were discharged prior to the expected graduation date of Spring 2005. Almost all of these students left the city and entered another school system. After adding admissions in Grades 10, 11, and 12 and removing students who transferred to other school systems, there were 67,269 students in the Class of 2005.

The 67,269 students in the Class of 2005 had the following characteristics:

- The Class of 2005 contained a slightly higher proportion of females than males (50.9 percent females and 49.1 percent males).
- The ethnic composition of the cohort was 34.3 percent African American, 33.8 percent Hispanic, 16.4 percent White, and 15.1 percent Asian. Less than one percent (0.4 percent) of the students were American Indian/Alaskan Natives. These percentages were nearly the same as those for the Class of 2004.
- Of the 67,269 students, 14.4 percent (9,702 students) were still English Language Learners (ELLs), students entitled to bilingual or English as a second language (ESL) services at the end of their high school careers. An additional 24.4 percent (16,414 students) were former ELLs, students who were at one time ELLs but who scored above the 40th percentile on the Language Assessment Battery, or in more recent years, tested out on the New York State Education Department's new exit exam, the New York State English as a Second Language Achievement Test (NYSESLAT), before they left high school. A higher percentage of the Class of 2005 were still ELLs at the end of four years of high school as compared to the Class of 2004 (12.7 percent).

- Over one-fifth (21.8 percent) of the students in the 2005 cohort were recent immigrants to the United States (14,688), a two percentage point increase over the previous class (19.8 percent). These students came from more than 170 different countries. Of these recent immigrants, 34.5 percent (5,061 students) entered the country in either Grade 7 or Grade 8. The remainder, 65.5 percent (9,627 students), entered the country sometime during or after Grade 9. The percentage of immigrants in the Class of 2005 who entered the New York City public school system at the beginning of high school is nearly ten percentage points higher than that of the Class of 2004 (56.0 percent). This difference may have had an impact on the four-year graduation rates for this group of students in the Class of 2005.

General Outcomes for the Class of 2005


The graduation rate for the Class of 2005 decreased 1.1 percentage points compared to the Class of 2004 while the percentage of students still enrolled in high school for a fifth year increased by 2.1 percentage points (31.6 percent compared to 29.4 percent in the Class of 2004). The dropout rate declined by 1.1 percentage points (from 16.3 percent in the Class of 2004 to 15.2 percent in the following class). The following are the specific outcomes for the Class of 2005 (see Figure 1):

- The four-year graduation rate for the Class of 2005 was 53.2 percent. This is 1.1 percentage points lower than that for the Class of 2004 (54.3 percent). Likewise, 31.6 percent remained enrolled in high school for a fifth year while less than one-fifth (15.2 percent) of the class dropped out at the end of the four years. The 2005 graduation rate is slightly lower than the previous two classes, 2004 (54.3 percent) and 2003 (53.4 percent). However, significant numbers of students are remaining enrolled for a fifth year of high school—more so than in previous classes, in part as a consequence of a change in New York State diploma requirements.
- The four-year graduation and still-enrolled rates are higher in the Class of 2005 (84.8 percent) as compared with the Class of 2004 (83.7 percent) and the Class of 2003 (79.7 percent).

Analyses of the Regents examination pass rates of students in the Class of 2005 still enrolled for a fifth year of high school support the notion that some students in the Class of 2005 are remaining in school in order to complete course credit and Regents examination requirements. Significant percentages of still-enrolled students are on track for a Regents and Local Diploma at the end of a fifth year of high school.

**** The Class of 2005 dropout statistics reflect students who dropped out by June 30th of their fourth year. The reduction in dropout rates is due, in part, to recent DOE policy requiring planning interviews for students above compulsory school age before schools are permitted to discharge them to dropout status. The interview process may delay many students from dropping out until their fifth, sixth, or seventh years, and those students will be captured when the DOE calculates final seven-year statistics for the Class of 2005; however, many students may remain enrolled in high school and graduate. As with prior classes, the final determination of the Class of 2005 dropout and graduation rates will not be known for an additional three years.

- The four-year dropout rate for the Class of 2005 was 15.2 percent, a percent decrease from the Class of 2004 (16.3 percent). In 2004, the dropout rate declined by 4 percentage points compared to 2003, 2002, and 2001. This 2004 reduction in dropout rates was attributable to a change in policy, specifically: in 2003-2004, DOE changed its policy and required exit interviews for some “over age 17” dropouts. The policy required that students who choose to leave school before they graduate with a diploma be provided with a planning interview with a guidance counselor, assistant principal or principal. The purpose of the planning interview is to (1) discuss with the student and parent the educational options that are available to the student, (2) encourage the student to remain in school, and, (3) if he/she still chooses to leave, to ensure that the student is apprised of his/her right to return to school until the age of 21. The policy continues to have some effect on four-year dropout statistics.
- Table 2 presents the status of the Class of 2005 for each of the four years of the study. It indicates that of the 10,239 students who dropped out, 2,060 did so after one (591) or two (1,469) years in high school, 2,563 did so after three years in high school, and 5,616 did so after four years.
- Table 3 presents the types of diplomas earned by the Class of 2005 graduates and the percentages of students receiving them. The Class of 2005 is the first to have two levels of Regents diplomas, in addition to a Local Diploma. The percentage of graduates awarded either Advanced Regents Diplomas (25.2 percent) or Regents Diplomas (35.5 percent) was 60.7 percent. Beginning in 2005, students received either (1) an Advanced Regents Diploma, earning the appropriate 22 units of credits and scoring at least 65 on eight Regents examinations; or, (2) a Regents Diploma by earning the appropriate 22 units of credits credits and scoring at least 65 on the five required Regents examinations in English, Mathematics, U.S. History and Government, Global History and Geography, and Science; or, (3) a Local Diploma by earning the appropriate 22 units of credits and scoring between a 55-64 on the five required Regents examinations. Prior to the class of 2005, students had to pass eight Regents examinations to receive a Regents Diploma, while Local Diploma requirements have remained the same.
- Table 4 presents the types of diplomas earned by the Classes of 2004 and 2005 and compares diplomas earned by graduates and diplomas earned if one examines all students in the cohort. Although 33.2 percent of graduates in the Class of 2004 earned a Regents Diploma, only 18.0 percent of the cohort as a whole graduated with a Regents Diploma at the end of four years. In 2005, 32.3 percent of graduates earned an Advanced Regents Diploma (18.9 percent of the cohort) and 25.2 percent of graduates earned a Regents Diploma (13.4 percent of the cohort). Of the 2005 cohort, 32.3 percent received either an Advanced Regents Diploma or a Regents Diploma—an increase of 14.3 percentage points over the

2004 cohort, in part because of changes in the New York State diploma requirements for a Regents Diploma.

- Table 5 summarizes the types of diplomas earned by students of different racial/ethnic groups in the Class of 2005. As indicated in this table, there is a wide disparity in the percentage of students earning Regents Diplomas by race/ethnicity with far higher percentages of White and Asian students receiving Regents Diplomas than Black or Hispanic students.

Outcomes by Student Groups

Outcomes by Gender

- A substantially higher percentage of females (57.7 percent) than males (48.6 percent) graduated on time (see Figure 2). The dropout rate of males was 4.0 percentage points higher than that of females (17.3 percent compared to 13.3 percent). Also, a higher percentage of males (34.1 percent) were still enrolled and entering a fifth year of high school compared to females (29.0 percent). These findings are similar to those reported for the Class of 2004.

Outcomes by Age for Grade on Entry into High School

- Many students who entered the cohort in Grade 9 were already overage for grade. This may be due to previous retention in our schools or because the students were overage when they entered the New York City public schools. Figure 3 indicates the percentage of students in each category who were either overage or the expected age for grade when they entered high school. As the results show, 82.9 percent of the students who graduated in four years were the expected age for grade when they entered Grade 9. In contrast, 35.4 percent of the students who became dropouts were the expected age when they entered Grade 9, and 64.6 percent were already overage for the grade. The percentages for the still-enrolled students are more similar to those for the graduates than the dropouts. Since the age-for-grade factor has a strong relationship with school completion, it is expected that a high percentage of the still-enrolled students will earn a degree in the fifth, sixth, and seventh years of high school.

Outcomes by Racial/Ethnic Background

- Figure 4 reports the four-year school-completion outcomes for each racial/ethnic group. As observed for earlier cohorts, White and Asian students had the highest four-year graduation rates (70.8 percent and 62.8 percent respectively) and the lowest dropout rates (10.0 percent and 9.8 percent respectively). Conversely, the graduation rate for Black students was 47.9 percent with a dropout rate of 15.6 percent. Hispanic students had a four-year graduation rate of 46.0 percent and a dropout rate of 19.7 percent. For American Indians/Alaskan Native students, the graduation rate was 39.1 percent and the dropout rate was 15.5 percent. Still enrolled rates were 19.1, 27.3, 36.5, 34.3, and 45.4 percent for White, Asian, Black, Hispanic, and American Indians/Alaskan Native students, respectively. Table 6 provides comparisons by racial/ethnic group for the Classes of 2001 through 2005.


- The gap between the graduation rates of Whites and Asians, on the one hand, and Blacks and Hispanics, on the other, decreased for students in the Class of 2005 both because the graduation rates of Whites and Asians declined, while those of Hispanics and Black each held stable or declined less than those of majority group students. For the Class of 2005, the dropout rate decreased for all but one racial/ethnic group. Specifically, the percentage point decrease in student dropout rates by group was: White (-0.6 of a percentage point); Black (-2.1 percentage points); American Indian/Alaskan Native (-6.5 percentage points); and Hispanic (-0.9 of a percentage point). The dropout rate increased slightly for Asian students (+0.3 of a percentage point). Graduation rates for Hispanics remained the same, while the graduation rate for American Indian/Alaskan Natives increased (3.8 percentage points). (Note: because there are few American Indian/Alaskan Native students system-wide, this group experiences greater year-to-year fluctuations in graduation, enrollment and dropout rates than other racial/ethnic groups.) Groups which experienced a decrease in graduation rates included: White (-1.1 percentage points); Asian (-4.1 percentage points); and Black (-0.9 of a percentage point).
- Finally, the percentage of students still enrolled for a fifth year of high school increased for all groups in 2005 (31.6 percent) compared with 2004 (29.4 percent). More students are staying in school for a fifth year to obtain a Regents diploma.

Outcomes for English Language Learners

- As reported earlier, 9,702 (14.4 percent) of the students in the Class of 2005 were still ELLs at the end of four years of high school, and 16,414 (24.4 percent) were former ELLs. (Former ELLs are students who tested out of a bilingual or free-standing English as a Second Language program.) These students spent at least part of their high school careers in bilingual or free-standing English as a Second Language programs.
- Overall, the school completion outcomes of current ELLs fall short of those for non-ELL students (see Figure 5). Current ELLs had lower four-year graduation rates than either former ELLs or English Proficient Students. However, ELLs were still enrolled at a much higher rate than former ELLs or English Proficient Students, suggesting that the gap in school completion outcomes between ELLs and the other groups will be reduced when the final statistics for the Class of 2005 are reported in the three-year follow-up study. This reduction in disparity has been observed consistently in three-year follow-up studies, including that for the Class of 2002, followed for three additional years until June 2005.

by Outcome Category for the Class of 2005**






Outcomes for Recent Immigrants


- In the Class of 2005, 21.8 percent (or 14,688 students) were identified as recent immigrants. Students who are recent immigrants can be divided into two groups. The first group, which represents 34.5 percent of recent immigrants, is comprised of students who first entered New York City public middle schools in Grade 7 or 8. The second group, representing 65.5 percent of recent immigrants, entered the Class of 2005 in Grade 9 or after. It is important to note that although many immigrants are ELLs, ELLs may be either immigrants or non-immigrants.
- The outcomes for the students in the Class of 2005 by immigrant status are reported in Figure 6. The results for the Class of 2005 are somewhat different from previous classes for the group labeled “Immigrants on Entry into Class of 2005.” As a group, immigrants come to our schools relatively prepared to succeed in high school. Students who were recent immigrants to our schools in grades 7 and 8 had a dropout rate of 14.4 percent, lower than the 15.2 percent dropout rate for all students citywide. The graduation rate for students who immigrated in grades 7 and 8 (57.6 percent) was higher than that of students who were immigrants when they entered the Class of 2005 in grades 9-12 (26.7 percent), and almost the same as that of non-immigrant students (57.7 percent).

Compared with the Class of 2004, there was a 15.5 percentage point decrease in the percent of students who graduated in 2005 and were immigrants when they entered the Class of 2005 (Class of 2004, 42.2 percent; Class of 2005, 26.7 percent). Likewise, there was a corresponding increase of 15.5 percentage points in the number of students who were still-enrolled and were immigrants when they entered the Class of 2005. The percentage of students who dropped out of school remained the same for both 2004 and 2005 (16.6 percent).

Similar to the trend observed among all “still-enrolled” students in the Class of 2005, analyses indicate that a sizable number of new immigrants who entered NYC school in Grade 9 are on track to obtain a Regents Diploma at the end of their fifth year of high school. It may well be that immigrants who enter our high schools in ninth grade are finding the increasingly more rigorous diploma requirements challenging to fulfill in four years but that significant numbers will be able to earn a high school diploma in five, six or seven years.

Outcomes by High School Type

The high schools that students attend can be categorized into six basic types. The Specialized High Schools require students to pass special entrance examinations. The Career and Technical Education Schools offer programs that prepare students for jobs in a vocational or technical area, as well as for college. The zoned Academic/-Comprehensive High Schools, many of which have special programs with various admission requirements, are required to accept all students who wish to attend and live in the school's zone. There are two types of alternative high schools: Articulated Alternative High Schools that accept ninth graders and Transfer Alternative High Schools that accept students as transfers from other high schools. Both types of Alternative High Schools provide smaller settings that emphasize academic and personal support. Retrieval/GED programs offer smaller settings designed for students with special problems, many of which place them at risk of dropping out such as substance abuse and criminal activity.

These programs provide individualized academic and personal assistance to their students so they can return to their high schools or prepare for the GED.

- As Figure 7 indicates, there was wide variation in the four-year outcomes for students by school type. Students in Specialized High Schools had the highest on-time graduation rate (95.2 percent) and lowest dropout rate (one-tenth of a percent). Students in Retrieval/GED programs had the highest dropout rate (51.6 percent), and students in Transfer Alternative High Schools had the highest still-enrolled rate (51.7 percent). These trends are similar to those reported for the Class of 2004.

Outcomes for Special Education Students

Students in the Special Education Class of 2005 were 14 years old during the 2000-2001 school year and enrolled in a citywide special education school or self-contained class in a middle school or high school. Due to the different nature of the programs, results for the Special Education Class of 2005 are reported separately for students in citywide programs (District 75) and high school self-contained classes. After excluding 430 students in citywide special education programs who were discharged to other school systems, 1,349 students were identified as members of that group. After excluding 2,834 students in high school self-contained classes who were discharged to other school systems, 4,464 students were identified as members of that group. The results for the Special Education Class of 2005, reported in Figure 8, indicate the following:

- Nearly three percent (2.9 percent) of the District 75 cohort graduated in four years in the Class of 2005, reflecting a continuing increase in the four-year graduation rate of students in this cohort (two percent of District 75 students graduated in 2004 and less than two percent in 2003). Likewise, the four-year

graduation rate for special education students in self-contained classes increased to 12.1 percentage points in the Class of 2005, (1.6 percentage points higher than that of the Class of 2004).

- For students in District 75 citywide programs, the Class of 2005 dropout rate was 16.8 percent, and the dropout rate for special education students in self-contained classes was 17.8 percent (See Figure 8). This represents an increase of 1.3 percentage points over the Class of 2004 (15.5 percent). The dropout rate for students in self-contained classes increased by 0.6 of a percentage point over the Class of 2004 (17.2 percent).
- Over three-fifths (70.1 percent) of the high school special education students in self-contained classrooms and four-fifths (80.3 percent) of the students in District 75 citywide programs were identified as still enrolled in school as of June 30, 2005. These percentages are slightly less than the comparable percentage of students still enrolled in the Class of 2004 (72.2 percent and 82.6 percent, respectively). However, that such large percentages of special education students are still enrolled after four years is not surprising. Many special education students are in programs designed to provide services until students are 21 years old. At that time, many of these students are expected to participate in adult programs for former special education students.

TRENDS

Trends Across Classes

- Dropout rates have been tracked longitudinally for the past several years. As Table 7 shows, the dropout rate for the Class of 2005 (15.2 percent) decreased by 1.1 percentage points compared to the Class of 2004 (16.3 percent), and more than 5 percentage points compared to the Class of 2003 (20.3 percent), 2002 (20.3 percent), and 2001 (20.4 percent). It is the lowest four-year dropout rate since at least 1992, and is due, in part, to a change in DOE policy requiring planning interviews before students may be discharged as dropouts. Some of these students decide to remain in school as a result of the planning interviews.

Trends in Event Dropout Rates

The event dropout rate represents the number of students who dropped out of high school for the first time during the 2004-05 school year, regardless of when they entered the system. Students are counted as dropouts if they left school by the end of the 2004-05 school year without re-enrolling in another educational setting leading to a


high school diploma or GED. Only students who were first-time dropouts during the 2004-05 school year are counted in this analysis. The counts include all students in the schools, including students in self-contained special education classes. Individual school event dropout rates as well as rates by Region appear in Appendix F.

As noted in Table 8, the event dropout rate in 2004-2005 (6.6 percent) was slightly higher than the event dropout rate in 2003-2004 (6.3 percent). During 2003-2004, the event dropout rate decreased by 4 percentage points. DOE changed its policy and required exit interviews for some “over 17” dropouts. This policy change contributed substantially to a reduction in the dropout rate. Further, during 2002-2003, the decrease in event dropout rates reflects changes in reporting procedures required by the New York State Education Department because of changes in decision rules for counting dropouts and for reflecting students’ status as of June 30th of the reporting year rather than as of the fall of the following year. For the purposes of comparison, dropout rates for 2001-2002 were recalculated using the same methodology as in 2002-2003.

As indicated in Table 8, the number of dropouts reported in the 2003-2004 year is slightly higher than in previous years when students who left school in June, and were readmitted the following fall, were not reflected in dropout counts.

for Citywide Programs and High School Self-Contained Classes**



CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

More than one-half (53.2 percent) of the students in the Class of 2005 graduated from high school. Since the Class of 2002, there has been a cumulative increase in the combined percentage of students who graduate in four years and those who remain enrolled for a fifth year of high school, from 79.7 percent in the Class of 2002 to 84.8 percent in the Class of 2005. Some students still-enrolled for a fifth year of high school are on track to complete their course credit requirements and Regents examinations for a Regents or Local diploma at the end of their fifth year of high school.

Close attention to the findings of the studies of the Classes over the past several years have led to a number of recommendations for systemic improvement of our schools. In coordination with efforts to improve attendance and prevent dropouts, high schools have implemented several instructional and organizational initiatives to enable a diverse student population to meet standards and graduation requirements. The following interventions include:

- Systemic and focused instructional initiative on secondary literacy and mathematics;
- Classroom libraries purchased to provide teachers with additional resources to address the literacy needs of students;
- Reduced class size and increased instructional time in English and Mathematics for students who have not yet met standards;
- Additional instruction before and after school and/or weekends, including additional in-class instructional support;
- Individual and small-group tutoring to improve basic skills;
- Summer school programs for students who are failing or who are at risk of failing to meet standards;
- Creation of new schools and new school designs to foster more personalized learning environments for students and families;
- Middle school to high school transitions. Fostering successful academic and developmental transition from middle to high school;
- Middle school and 9th grade intervention initiatives (including a new 7th grade promotional policy) with the goal of improving middle school achievement and preparedness for high school work;
- Establishment of various program designs, such as the Young Adult Borough Centers (YABC) and Day and Evening High Schools, for older students who are unable to attend high school during regular school hours;
- System-wide focus on parent and family involvement to ensure more parent participation and parent input through the creation of parent coordinators at each school and parent outreach centers at Regional Offices;
- Sustained and on-going professional development and support for teachers, including the provision of literacy and mathematics coaches in schools; and
- The addition of instructional and professional development time to school schedules to further student learning and professional growth for teachers.

More specific and sustained focus on the support and encouragement of students who fear they may 'age-out' without ever meeting the new standards will help to keep more of these students in school long enough to meet the new requirements. The New York City Department of Education's continued focus on the creation of multiple pathways to graduation for students, on the implementation of standards-based curriculum and instruction for all students, and enhanced family engagement will help to ensure that all students meet these higher standards.

APPENDIX F

2004-2005 EVENT DROPOUT RATES

The event dropout rate represents the number of students who dropped out of high school during the 2004-2005 school year, regardless of when they entered the school system. Students are counted as dropouts if they left school by the end of the 2004-2005 school year without re-enrolling in another educational setting leading to a high school diploma or GED. Only students who were first-time dropouts during the 2004-2005 school year are counted. The counts include all students in the schools, including students in self-contained special education classes. The event dropout rate for 2004-2005 reflects differences in reporting procedures required by the New York State Education Department because of changes in decision rules for counting dropouts and for reflecting students' status as of June 30th of the reporting year rather than as of the fall of the following year.
