



Army Senior ROTC is expanding in New York City

The leadership of the City University of New York is working with the U.S. Army Cadet Command to expand Army Senior ROTC opportunities available to the 480,000 students in CUNY's system of 24 colleges across the city.

For a number of years, Army ROTC opportunities at the college level have been limited in New York City. Although college students have been able to take Senior ROTC courses through partnerships with existing programs at Fordham and St. John's, classes and activities at these schools were difficult for many students in other parts of the city to reach.

The Army wants to do more for NYC students, and ROTC will soon be offered at schools in all five boroughs to make ROTC available and convenient to students throughout the city.

The Army has already begun teaching Military Science classes York College in Queens, and began teaching classes at Medgar Evers College in Brooklyn this Spring.

Next Fall, the Army plans to open offices and begin teaching Military Science classes again at The City College of New York in Manhattan. Army ROTC has a long history at City College, the alma mater of General Colin Powell, but has not had a presence on that campus since the seventies.

As you consider your college options – here in New York City, or beyond – the New York City Department of Education encourages you to consider adding Army Senior ROTC Military Science classes to your plan. There's no military obligation to enroll.

When you register and take Army ROTC course electives, you'll be on the path to leadership. You'll learn lessons that go beyond the classroom. And, as an Army ROTC Cadet, you may be eligible for a monthly allowance of up to \$500, and the opportunity to compete for a full-tuition scholarship. When you graduate and complete Army ROTC, you will leave ready to lead – as an Officer in the U.S. Army, Army Reserve or Army National Guard.

Through classes and field training, Army ROTC provides you with the tools to become an Army Officer without interfering with your other classes. ROTC also provides you with discipline and money for tuition while enhancing your college experience.

Talk to the cadre at the Military Science departments at our CUNY schools about ways to join Army ROTC and incentives available, including opportunities to compete for two-, three-, or four-year scholarships.
