

ONLINE COURSE: Introduction to Common Core Literacy

October 14 – October 28, 2013

Introduction to Common Core Literacy is a two-week online course (approximately 6 – 8 hours in total) that provides an overview of the Common Core Standards for English Language Arts and Literacy and their relationship to the Danielson *Framework for Teaching*, a vital part of *Advance*, the DOE's new teacher evaluation and development system. The course will illuminate the connection between curriculum and instruction, *what* is taught and *how* it is taught.

Course participants will complete readings, watch videos and engage in online discussion (3 – 4 times per week) about the “common language” provided by the Common Core and the Danielson *Framework*, the Common Core instructional shifts, and how these impact what happens in their actual classrooms. This course will lay the foundation for three additional online courses that focus on practical implementation of the Common Core instructional shifts.

Educators with limited familiarity with the Common Core Standards for English Language Arts and Literacy and the Danielson *Framework* are highly encouraged to enroll. You may take this course for P-credit or simply to improve your own knowledge and network with other DOE educators.

Course Objectives

The guiding question for participants in this course is: What are the core elements of the Common Core Standards for English Language Arts and Literacy and the Danielson *Framework for Teaching* and how do they apply to my teaching?

The two major course objectives are:

- Participants will gain understanding of how the Common Core Standards and the Danielson *Framework* interrelate and be able to articulate how they impact teaching and learning in the classroom.
- Participants will gain an understanding of the instructional shifts and will identify how available resources, both within and outside of the DOE, can be used to support their implementation of the shifts.

Frequently Asked Questions

Who is this course for?

This course is for DOE educators who wish to engage in a structured exploration of how the Common Core Standards are being implemented in New York City. The course will help participants gain a clearer understanding of the standards themselves, their relationship to teaching and learning in New York City classrooms, and available resources to improve teacher practice.

What is the course structure?

This course will be conducted entirely online and will present participants with a variety of timely, authentic texts and videos that bring to life the key initiatives that are impacting teachers and students in New York City schools, namely: the implementation of Common Core Standards for English Language Arts and Literacy and *Advance*, the new teacher evaluation and development system. After reading and viewing primary materials that elucidate the expectations and challenges facing teachers and students today, participants will engage in authentic online discussions moderated by DOE content-area experts. These discussions will provide a unique opportunity for participants to pose questions that directly impact their instructional practice and professional development, share resources, and to genuinely engage in a professional learning community with other DOE educators.

The course is divided into four sections:

1. An Overview of the Common Core Standards, the Danielson *Framework for Teaching*, and Content Area Standards
2. Deep Dive – The Common Core Literacy Standards
3. Deep Dive – Teacher Effectiveness and the Danielson *Framework for Teaching*
4. The Instructional Shifts, Available Resources, & Next Steps

How will I be assessed?

Participants are expected to participate authentically several times per week in online discussions. The discussion boards do not take place live; participants can post to them at their convenience throughout the three or four days that the discussion window remains open for that topic. Facilitators will engage actively in the online discussions and provide updates after the timeframe for each discussion has ended.

Do I get any credit for this course?

Those who complete the course successfully can apply for one P-credit through the [After School Professional Development Program](#). Participants seeking P-credit must sign up by the first day of classes for a fee of \$45. Regardless of whether an individual takes the course for P-credit, those who finish the course will receive a certificate of accomplishment.
