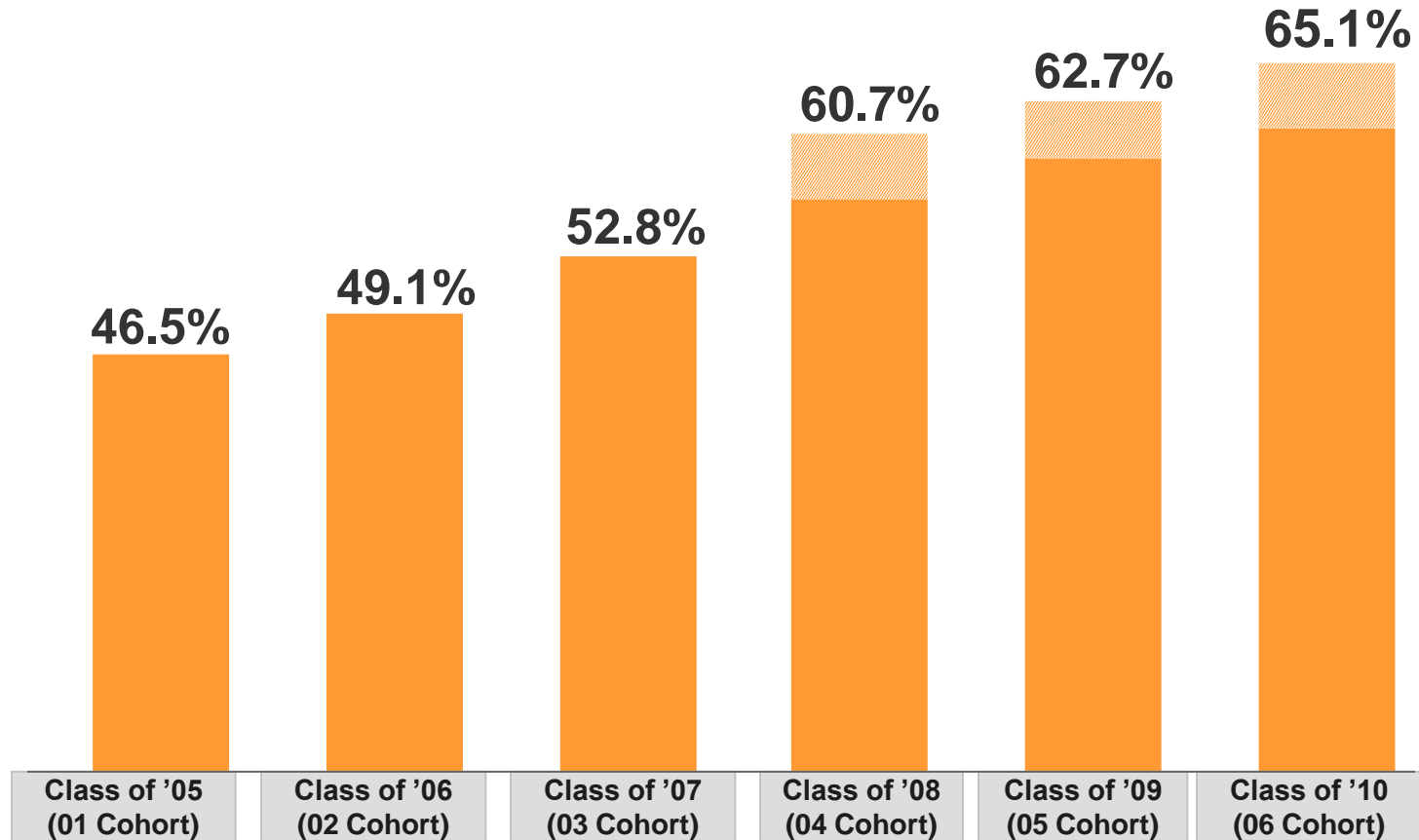

NY STATE CALCULATION METHOD

Graduation Rate

2005-2010: + 40%



4-Year Rate

4-Year Rate w/ August (NY State reports graduation rates as of both June and August, including summer graduates, for 2008-2010.)

Notes: The NY State method, used since 2005, includes Local and Regents Diplomas and all disabled students. It does not include GEDs and Special Education diplomas. Beginning with the Class of 2009, students must pass 2 out of 5 Regents with a 65 or above to receive a Local Diploma. August graduate data is only available for years 2008-2010.

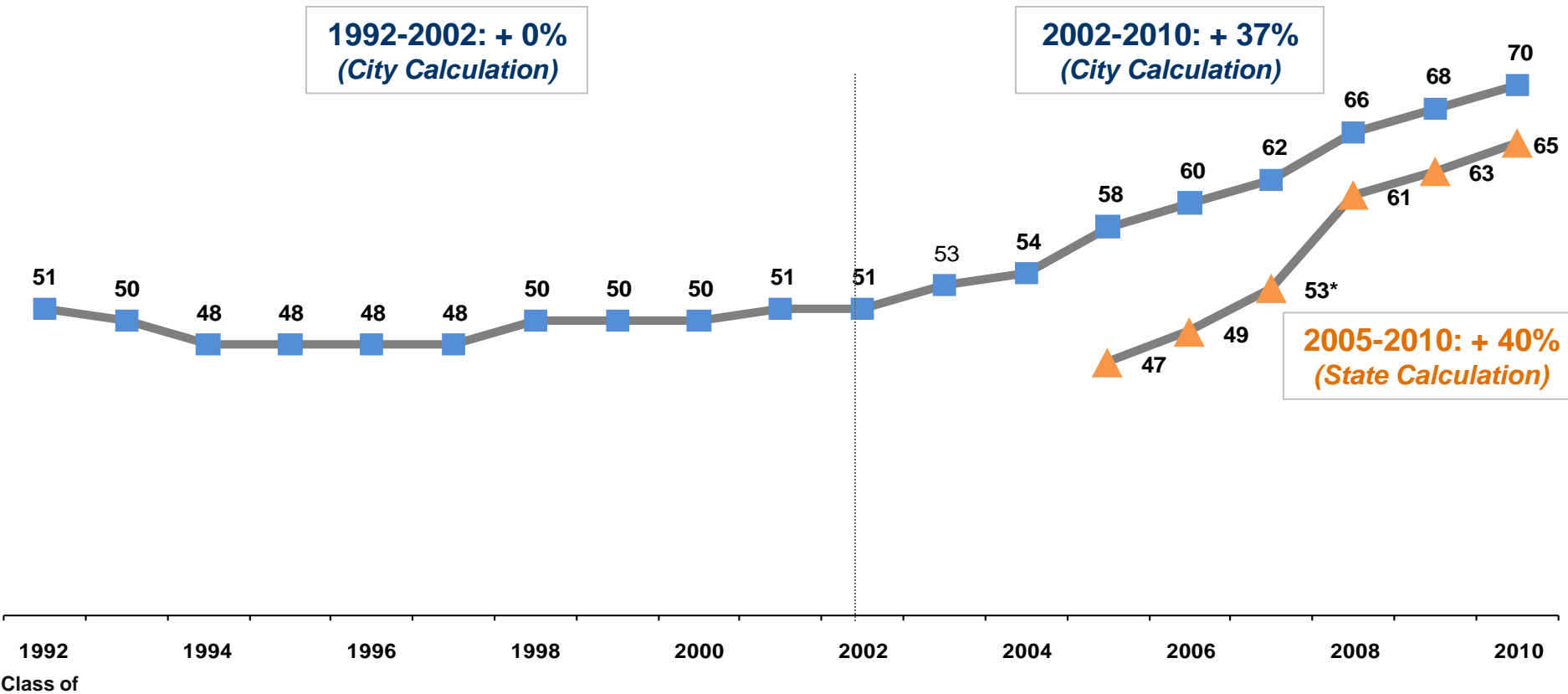

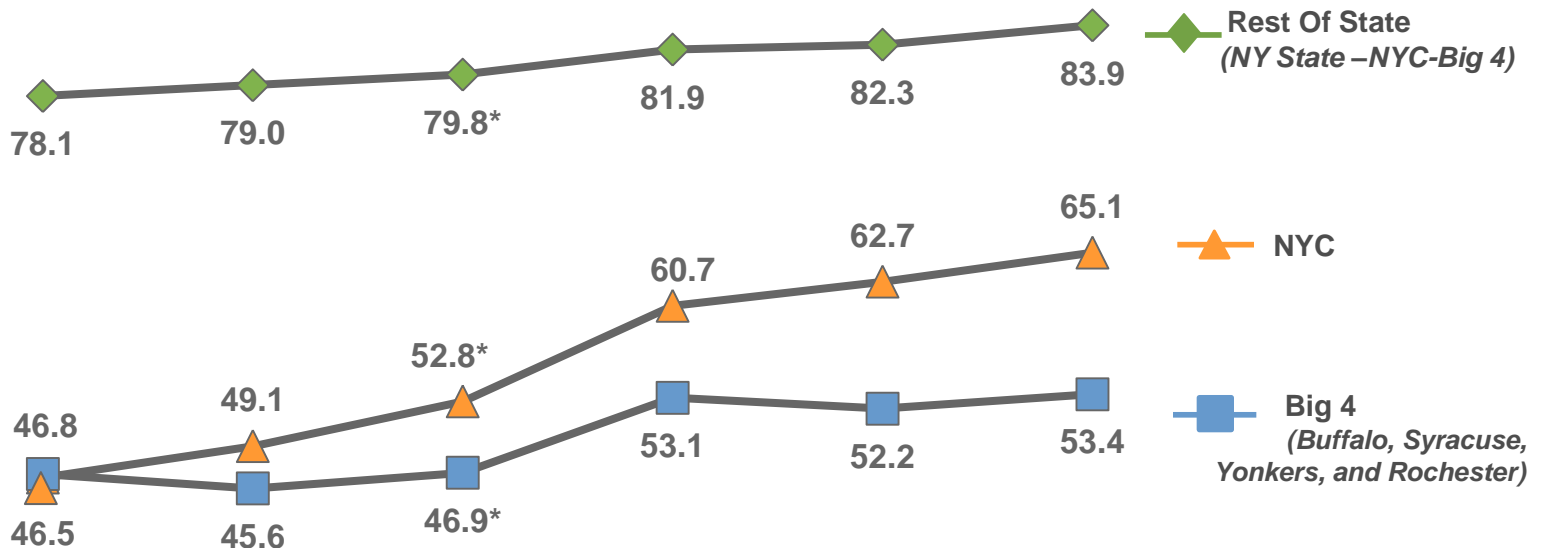

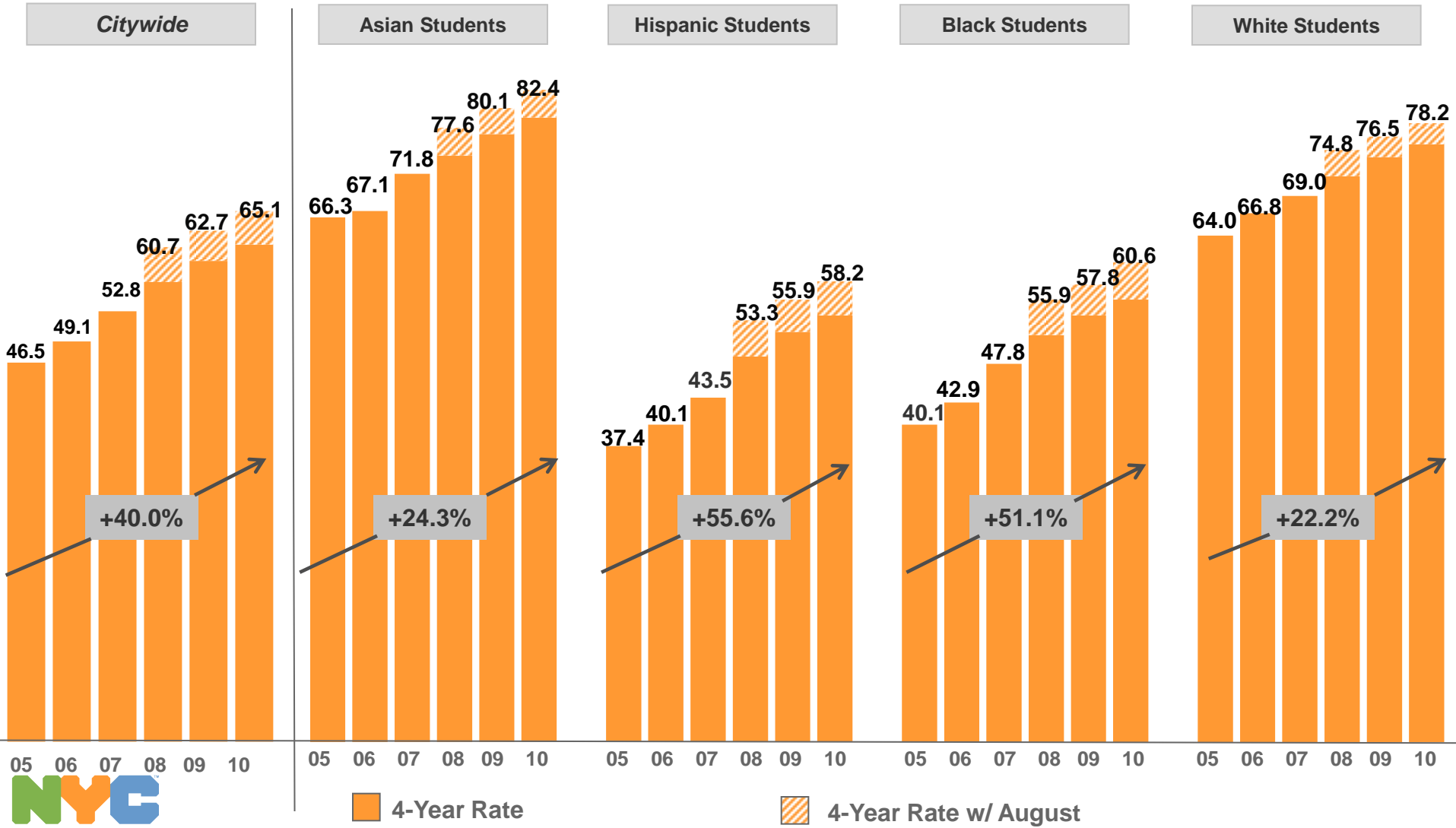

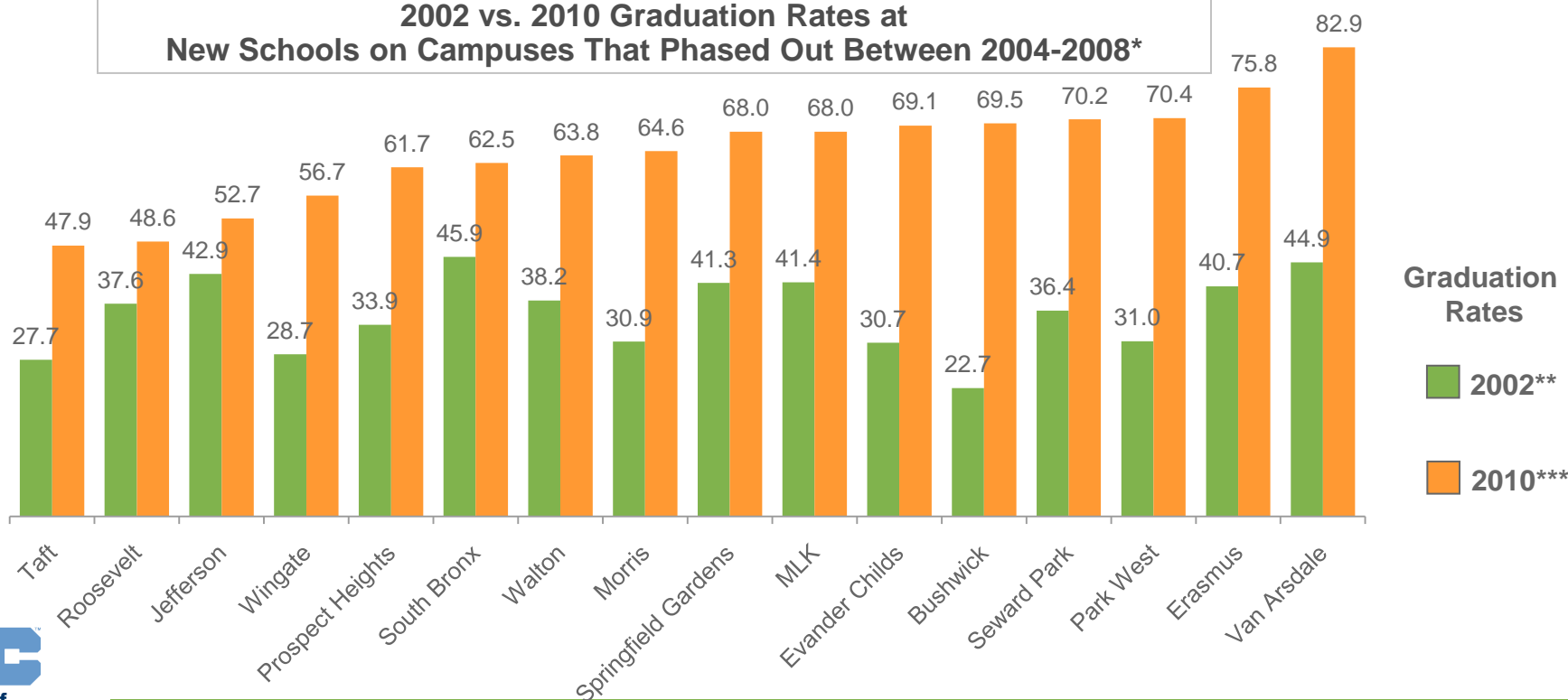
GRADUATION RATES AT NEW SCHOOLS ARE HIGHER THAN THE HIGH SCHOOLS THEY REPLACED

As a school phases out one year at a time, impacted students may stay and work towards a diploma (e.g., the following year it will not admit new students but will continue to support its remaining students).

Conversely, new schools are phased in one year at a time, and largely serve the same general population of students from the phase out schools.

Every school in NYC, those that are phasing out and the new schools, is funded through the same fair student funding model.

2002 vs. 2010 Graduation Rates at New Schools on Campuses That Phased Out Between 2004-2008*



*Schools presented on slide were all announced for phase out between 2002-2006. *NYC traditional calculation includes Local and Regents Diplomas, GEDs, Special Education diplomas, and August graduates. It does not include disabled students in self-contained classrooms or District 75 students.
