

## **EDUCATIONAL IMPACT STATEMENT:**

# **The Proposed Extension and Expansion of the Co-location of Bronx Success Academy 2 (84X494) with P.S. 146 Edward Collins (08X146) in Building X146 for the 2011-2012 School Year**

### **I. Summary of Proposal**

Bronx Success Academy 2 Charter School (84X494, “BSA 2”) is an existing elementary charter school located at 968 Cauldwell Avenue, Bronx, NY 10456 in Community School District 8, in building X146 (“X146”). BSA 2 currently serves students in kindergarten through first grade. This is a proposal to extend the duration and expand the scope of the “co-location” of BSA 2 by adding a second grade in X146, where it is currently sited with P.S. 146 Edward Collins (08X146, “P.S. 146”), an existing zoned elementary school, for the 2011-2012 school year. P.S. 146 currently serves students in kindergarten through fifth grade and offers a pre-kindergarten program. A “co-location” means that two or more school organizations are located in the same building and may share common spaces like auditoriums, gymnasiums, and cafeterias.

The Panel for Educational Policy (“PEP”) approved the proposal to temporarily co-locate BSA 2’s kindergarten and first grade with P.S. 146 on February 24, 2010, and BSA 2 opened in X146 in August 2010. Under the original proposal approved by the PEP, BSA 2 was expected to be co-located with P.S. 146 for the 2010-2011 school year only. After diligent efforts, the Department of Education (“DOE”) was not able to identify a permanent location for BSA 2. Therefore, the DOE proposes that BSA 2 stay in X146 for one additional year as it continues to phase in and adds a second grade, and as the DOE continues to search for an alternative site. This would mean that BSA 2 would continue to be co-located with P.S. 146 and would serve kindergarten through second grade in the 2011-2012 school year.

The Office of Space Planning reviewed the X146 school building in October 2010. Based on that office’s evaluation, there are a sufficient number of rooms to permit P.S. 146 to continue operating at full organizational capacity and to accommodate BSA 2 for an additional school year.

BSA 2 is chartered to serve grades kindergarten through five.<sup>1</sup> The DOE recognizes there is not sufficient space in X146 for BSA 2 to grow to full scale based on its chartered enrollment plan. The DOE will consider all long-term options to accommodate the anticipated growth of BSA 2, including re-siting BSA 2, requesting that BSA 2 revise its enrollment plan, and/or siting certain of BSA 2’s grades in X146 permanently and siting other grades in a different location. Any proposal to extend or make permanent the co-location of BSA 2 with P.S. 146 for all or some of BSA 2’s grades would be the subject of a subsequent Educational Impact Statement (“EIS”).

## II. Proposed or Potential Use of Building X146

If this proposal is approved, X146 will continue to be occupied by P.S. 146 and BSA 2 for the 2011-2012 school year. X146 has a 2009-2010 target capacity of 630 and a target utilization rate of 102%.<sup>2,3</sup> The 2010-2011 unaudited enrollment at BSA 2 and P.S. 146 is 194 and 457 students, respectively.<sup>4</sup> Thus, the 2010-2011 target utilization rate for X146 would be 103%. With the addition of approximately 54 students at BSA 2, and stable enrollment at P.S. 146, the projected total enrollment at X146 would be approximately 615-715 students in 2011-2012. The 2011-2012 utilization rate of X146 is expected to be approximately 113%.

As described in more detail in the Enrollment, Capacity, Utilization Report, which is available at [http://source.nycsca.org/pdf/capitalplan/2009-10/BB\\_2009\\_2010.pdf](http://source.nycsca.org/pdf/capitalplan/2009-10/BB_2009_2010.pdf), a building's target utilization rate is calculated by dividing the aggregated enrollment of all the school organizations in the building by the aggregated "target capacities" of those organizations. Each school organization's "target capacity" is calculated based upon the scheduled use of individual rooms as reported by principals during an annual facilities survey, the DOE's goals for classroom capacities (which are aspirational targets that are lower than the UFT contractual class sizes and differ depending on grade level), and the efficiency with which classrooms are programmed (i.e., the frequency with which classes are scheduled in a given classroom).

The most recent year for which target capacity has been calculated for buildings is 2009-2010. As described earlier in this EIS, the DOE's projected utilization rates for the 2010-2011 school year and beyond are based on the 2009-2010 target capacity, which assumes that the components underlying that target capacity (scheduled use of classrooms, classroom capacity, etc.) remain constant. Thus, projected utilization rates for 2010-2011 and beyond provide only an approximation of a building's usage because each of the factors underlying target capacity may be adjusted by principals from year to year to better accommodate students' needs. For example, changing the use of a room from an administrative room to a homeroom at the high school level will increase a building's overall target capacity because for high schools administrative rooms are not assigned a capacity. Holding enrollment constant, this change would result in a lower utilization rate. Similarly, if a room previously used as a kindergarten classroom is subsequently used as a fifth grade classroom, the building's target capacity would increase because we expect that a fifth grade class will have more students than a kindergarten class. This is reflected in the fact that the DOE's goal for classroom capacity is higher for fifth-grade classrooms than for kindergarten classrooms. In this example, as well, assuming enrollment is constant, the utilization rate would decrease.

Although a utilization rate in excess of 100% may suggest that a building will be over-utilized or over-crowded in a given year, this rate does not account for the fact that rooms may be programmed for more efficient or different uses than the standard assumptions in the utilization calculation, as described above. In addition, charter school enrollment plans are frequently based on larger class sizes than target capacity,

However, the building enrollment figures referenced throughout this EIS and used in the calculation of utilization rates only include the projected number of students who are actually projected to attend the school and do not include LTAs. In determining the space allocation for co-located schools, the Office of Space Planning will conduct a detailed site survey and space analysis of the building to assess the amount of space available in the building.

contributing to building utilizations above 100% which should not impact the utilization of the space allocated to the traditional public school. Here, utilization above 100% of X146’s building capacity is largely driven by class sizes at BSA 2, which are larger than the DOE target class size of 20 students in grades K-3. BSA 2 projects 25-28 students per class in these grades, resulting in utilization rates of 125-140% for these rooms. The class sizes for P.S. 146 are well within (and will continue to be within) the UFT contractual class size limit, but in some cases are greater than 20 students per class in grades K-3. Just as BSA 2’s class sizes affect the utilization rate, the class sizes for P.S. 146 also impact X146’s utilization rate. Class sizes at P.S. 146 will remain within the UFT contractual class limits in 2011-2012. The attached Building Utilization Plan sets forth the baseline number of rooms to be allocated to each school pursuant to the Citywide Instructional Footprint (the “Footprint”) as well as the total number of rooms in a building to provide a more complete picture of the availability of space in a building. There are no proposed additional uses for the building.

### III. Impact of the Proposal on Affected Students, Schools, and Community

#### A. Students

##### *Impact on P.S. 146 Students*

P.S. 146 serves 36 students in its pre-kindergarten program and 421<sup>5</sup> general education students and students with disabilities in kindergarten through fifth grade, in 23 homeroom sections. In 2009-2010, the last year in which audited data is available, approximately 15% of P.S. 146 students were eligible to receive English Language Learner (“ELL”) services.<sup>6</sup> P.S. 146 currently offers a total of five classes for students who require Self-Contained special education services (“SC”). In addition, P.S. 146 currently operates two sections of a full-day pre-kindergarten program. The DOE does not anticipate that this proposal will have any impact on P.S. 146’s provision of special education or ELL services or its pre-kindergarten program.

Further, based on historical zoned enrollment trends at P.S. 146, any student zoned for P.S. 146 will continue to have the opportunity to attend P.S. 146, and it will not be necessary for P.S. 146 to decrease its total enrollment in order to accommodate BSA 2 within X146. It is possible, however, that P.S. 146’s

enrollment will decrease as a result of demographic changes within the community. The 2009-2010 Audited Register at P.S. 146 for grades Kindergarten through five was 457 students. The current register in grades Kindergarten through five is 421, a decrease of 36 students overall.

Currently, P.S. 146 offers the following enrichment programs:

- Art, Chess, Dance, Step, Chorus, Music

In addition, P.S. 146 offers the following academic programs:

- Technology
  - Waterford Early Learning (grades Kindergarten-2): provides instructional support through interactive videos, animation and songs
  - Successmaker, Kidbiz, and Comfit for Learning (grades 3-5): interactive multimedia and internet educational programs
- Academic Intervention Programs
- After-school programs
- Saturday school

There are currently no community-based organizations (“CBOs”) located within X146. There is currently one CBO, New York Junior Tennis League, which works with P.S. 146 students. This CBO provides homework help, arts and tennis instruction.

Neither the academic nor the enrichment programs that P.S. 146 offers are expected to be impacted by this proposal. However, all schools modify extracurricular and programmatic offerings annually based on student demand and available resources, so there is no guarantee that the specific programs listed would continue to be offered in the future. We anticipate that P.S. 146 would continue to offer comparable opportunities to its students.

Current fifth graders at P.S. 146 will participate in the District 8 Middle School Choice application process to enter middle school as is current practice. Information about all of these options is printed in each district’s Middle School Choice Directory which can be found at <http://schools.nyc.gov/ChoicesEnrollment/Middle/Publications/Bronx>. Please note that this directory is updated yearly. Students may also elect to attend their zoned school.

In addition, there are four existing public charter schools in District 8 which provide a preference for District 8 students through the charter lottery application process. Those schools are listed below:

*Impact on BSA 2 Students*

BSA 2 serves 194 general education students and students with disabilities in kindergarten through first grade. If this proposal is approved, current first graders will have the opportunity to remain at BSA 2 for second grade. Next year, BSA 2 will serve approximately 220-249 students in kindergarten through second grade. BSA 2 will continue to provide mandated services to students with an Individualized Education Program (“IEP”) or to those requiring ESL instruction. Students may continue to apply to BSA 2 through its charter lottery process.

*Impact on Future Pre-kindergarten Students*

P.S. 146 currently offers 2 sections of full-day pre-kindergarten with a projected total enrollment of 36 students. Barring any changes in available funding or student enrollment, the pre-kindergarten program at P.S. 146 would continue to exist and should not be adversely affected by this proposal.<sup>8</sup> The enrollment policy for pre-kindergarten admissions would also remain the same. Younger siblings of zoned students already enrolled in P.S. 146 would get first preference in pre-kindergarten admissions. Siblings from outside the zone would receive second preference.

**B. Schools**

There will be sufficient space for BSA 2 to expand by one grade in 2011-2012 and continue to be co-located with P.S. 146 in X146.

In 2011-2012, the DOE projects that P.S. 146 will serve between 395-466 students (including pre-kindergarten students and students with disabilities) and would continue to have 23 classes. According to its charter, BSA 2 will serve up to 249 students in grade(s) kindergarten through second grade, in 10 classes (including students with disabilities) in the 2011-2012 school year. As the attached Building Utilization Plan details, if this proposal is approved, there will be sufficient space to accommodate P.S. 146 and BSA 2 pursuant to the Footprint in 2011-2012.

In accordance with New York State Charter Schools Act of 1998 (as amended), the Chancellor or his/her designee must first authorize in writing any proposed capital improvement or facility upgrade in excess of five thousand dollars, regardless of the source of funding, made to accommodate the co-location of a charter school within a public school building. For any such improvements or upgrades that have been approved by the Chancellor, capital improvements or facility upgrades shall be made in an amount equal to the expenditure of the charter school for each non-charter school within the public school building. For any capital improvements or facility upgrades in excess of five thousand dollars that have been approved by the Chancellor, regardless of the source of funding, made in a charter school that is already co-located within a public school building, matching capital improvements or facility upgrades shall be made in an amount equal to the expenditure of the charter school for each non-charter public school within the public school building within three months of such improvements or upgrades.

There are no current plans for capital improvements or facilities upgrades to X146 at this time.

**C. Community**

The DOE supports BSA 2 as a high-quality option for Community School District 8. BSA 2 is a school in the Success Charter Network, a Charter Management Organization (“CMO”) that operates seven public charter schools in New York City. Harlem Success Academy 1 (“HSA 1”), the first public charter school opened by the Success Charter Network, is a high-performing school located in the Harlem neighborhood of Community School District 3. In 2009-10, 86% of HSA 1 students scored at or above grade level on the State English language arts (ELA) test, and 94% of students scored at or above grade level on the State math test. Because BSA 2 only opened in the 2010-2011 school year, the school does not yet have a Progress Report grade.

BSA 2 gives preference to residents of District 8 and offers a choice to families who are looking for an option other than their zoned school. In 2009-10, 30% of District 8 residents enrolled their general education Kindergarten children into a school other than their zoned school. This demonstrates that there is demand for additional unzoned school options in this community. Currently, 29% of the students enrolled in BSA 2 are residents of District 8. The DOE anticipates that a greater percentage of District 8 residents will enter BSA 2’s lottery this year due to the fact that BSA 2 is better known within the community and that BSA 2 can begin targeted recruitment earlier than they were able to begin last year. There are 6 unzoned elementary schools in District 8, including BSA 2. The other unzoned schools that serve elementary grades are: Hyde Leadership Charter School, Metropolitan Lighthouse Charter School, Bronx Charter School for Arts, Girls Preparatory Charter School of the Bronx, and P.S. 304 Early Childhood School.

Several zoned elementary schools in District 8 have seen significant increases in student registers in recent years and are experiencing overcrowding, although as discussed above, P.S. 146 is actually experiencing a decreasing enrollment trend. As a school that exercises an admissions preference for District 8 residents, BSA 2 can help alleviate overcrowding at other zoned schools in the district.

The DOE does not expect that this proposal will impact the ability of community members to obtain school building use permits pursuant to section 414 of the Education Law.

**V. Initial Costs and Savings**

**VI. Effect on Personnel Needs, Costs of Instruction, Administration, Transportation and Other Support Services**

**A. Personnel Needs**

BSA 2 will need to hire additional teachers during its grade expansion as the total number of students enrolled in the school increases next year. The precise number of positions needed for the 2011-2012 school year will be determined based upon BSA 2’s budget and staffing plan.

Administrative staff and non-pedagogical positions at BSA 2 may also be added over the course of the grade expansion. Those decisions will be made at the school based on need and budgetary considerations.

There will be no impact on P.S. 146’s personnel needs as a result of this proposal.

## **B. Cost of Instruction**

This proposal should not impact the operating budget or costs of instruction at P.S. 146. The basic operating budget for those schools is determined by the same Fair Student Funding (FSF) formula used at all other New York City District public schools. Under FSF, schools receive City tax levy funding on a per-pupil basis. Each student receives a per-pupil allocation based on the grade level of the student. FSF allocations are subject to annual variation, but for 2010-2011, the base per-pupil allocation for elementary schools was \$4,059.71. In addition, FSF awards supplemental allocations on a per-pupil basis for students who have additional needs and therefore cost more to educate. For example, during the 2010-2011 school year, elementary schools received an additional \$1,623.00 per pupil for each English Language Learner they enrolled. At the elementary level, supplemental funds are awarded for each student who is an English Language Learner, who requires special education services, or who is eligible for free or reduced-price lunch. For middle and high schools, supplemental funds are awarded to each student who is an English Language Learner, who requires special education services, or who is performing below grade level upon enrollment. In the case of students who fall into more than one of these categories, schools are awarded supplemental funding to meet all of those needs.

FSF covers basic instructional expenses and FSF funds may, at the school's discretion, be used to hire staff, purchase supplies and materials, or implement instructional programs. As the total number of students enrolled grows, the overall budget will increase accordingly, allowing the school to meet the instructional needs of its larger student population. Similarly, if the total number of students enrolled falls, the budget shrinks accordingly, as the school will need fewer supplies and potentially a smaller staff. As with all other schools citywide, P.S. 146 may receive additional "categorical" funding based on student characteristics and needs. For example, federal Title I funding is awarded to schools based on the proportion of low-income students they enroll. This school is currently eligible for Title I funding. Assuming that the schools continue to meet Title I criteria, the size of their respective Title I funding awards would grow or shrink as the school population grows or shrinks. While schools do receive supplemental support for special education students through Fair Student Funding, that only represents part of the funding provided to support those students. Schools are budgeted to meet the needs of their special education students as defined by their Individualized Education Plans ("IEPs"). P.S. 146 will continue to receive funds to meet the needs of all special education students in accordance with their IEPs. Please note that increased or reduced per capita funds allocated to the school as a result of changes in enrollment that may occur do not represent net/incremental system costs. All dollar amounts are based on FY10 allocations and are subject to annual variation based on adjustments to the DOE's overall operating budget.

The General Education Charter School per-pupil rate is determined by the New York State Education Department (NYSED), and is based on a formula used for all traditional public school districts. The formula divides the district's Approved Operating Expenditures (AOE) by Total Allowable Pupil Units (TAPU). Special Education funding is an allocation that Charter Schools may qualify for and receive for serving students that receive special education services for more than 20% of the week as mandated by an IEP.

## **C. Administration**

No impacts on P.S. 146 school supervisors and/or administration are anticipated as a result of this proposal.

BSA 2 is expected to hire school supervisors and/or administrator personnel as needed.

## **D. Transportation**

There will be no change to existing transportation practices at P.S. 146 or BSA 2 due to this proposal. Transportation will be provided according to Chancellor's Regulation A-801:
