Who we are

YABC:

Young Adult Borough Center

YABCs are late afternoon and evening programs designed to serve older students who are in their fifth year of high school and have a minimum of 17 credits. These students might be considering dropping out because they are behind or have adult responsibilities that make attending school in the daytime difficult.

Students who are enrolled in a YABC program:

- Attend classes up to five evenings or late afternoons per week
- Participate in workshops and get support to prepare for college, meaningful employment, healthy personal relationships, and life after high school
- Have access to tutoring and student support services before school hours
- Have the opportunity to participate in academic and extracurricular activities

YABC students graduate with a diploma from their home school after they have earned all of their credits and passed all of the required exams.

YABC with Learning to Work: YABC/LTW

LTW is an in-depth job-readiness and career exploration component of most YABCs. Students who enroll in a YABC with a LTW component have the opportunity to participate in LTW program activities.

YABC/LTW helps students:

- Develop the skills they need to complete high school, gain employment, and succeed at work
- Expand their knowledge of career and college options
- Plan for meaningful experiences after high school
- Secure paid internships

Students who are enrolled in the YABC/LTW program have the opportunity to participate in:

- Job skills development activities, such as workshops, seminars, lectures, and field trips
- Paid internships

Who you are

To be eligible for enrollment in a YABC or YABC/LTW program, a student must:

- Be 17½* to 21 years old
- Be enrolled or become enrolled in a NYC high school
- Have a minimum of 17 course credits
- Be in the fifth year (or more) of high school

*Students must have completed the school year in which he/she turns 17. The school year begins July 1st.
