

REVISED EDUCATIONAL IMPACT STATEMENT: The Proposed Opening and Co-location of a New Elementary School (17K532) with Existing School P.S. 167 The Parkway (17K167) and a New Public Elementary Charter School Success Academy Charter School - Brooklyn 7 (84KTBD) in Building K167 Beginning in 2013-2014

I. Summary of Proposal

On January 11, 2013, the New York City Department of Education (“DOE”) issued an Educational Impact Statement (“EIS”) proposing to open and co-locate¹ a new elementary school, 17K532 (“17K532”), that will serve students in kindergarten through fifth grade and offer two sections of full day pre-kindergarten in building K167 (“K167”) located at 1025 Eastern Parkway, Brooklyn, NY, 11213, in Community School District 17 (“District 17”). In a separate EIS posted on January 11, 2013, the DOE has proposed to gradually phase out and eventually close P.S. 167 because of its low performance and inability to improve quickly to better support student needs. The EIS describing that proposal can be found here: <http://schools.nyc.gov/AboutUs/leadership/PEP/publicnotice/2012-2013/Mar112013Proposals.htm>. If the phase-out proposal is approved, P.S. 167 will no longer admit new kindergarten students, will no longer offer first or second grade, and will no longer offer its pre-kindergarten program after the 2012-2013 school year. Therefore, in 2013-2014, P.S. 167 will serve only third-, fourth-, and fifth-grade students. P.S. 167 will subsequently phase out one grade each year until it completes its phase-out and closes in June 2016.

In a separate EIS posted on March 1, 2013, the DOE has proposed to site a new charter school, Success Academy Charter School Brooklyn 7 (84KTBD, “SA-Brooklyn 7”) in building K167 beginning in the 2013-2014 school year. The EIS describing that proposal can be found here: <http://schools.nyc.gov/AboutUs/leadership/PEP/publicnotice/2012-2013/April2013Proposals.htm>. As a result, the DOE is now revising this EIS to reflect the proposed co-location of the kindergarten through second grades of SA – Brooklyn 7 in building K167. This revised EIS reflects the new number of students who will be served in the K167 building and the utilization of the building during each year of the phase in of both schools. This EIS also reflects updated enrollment data from the Audited Register. Information about space in building K167 has been removed from this EIS and is included in the Building Utilization Plan (“BUP”) attached to the proposal to open and co-locate SA – Brooklyn 7 in building K167.

If this proposal and the proposal to open and co-locate SA—Brooklyn 7 are approved, 17K532 and SA – Brooklyn 7 will be co-located in K167 with P.S. 167 The Parkway (17K167, “P.S. 167”), an existing elementary school that currently serves students in kindergarten through fifth grade and offers two sections of full day pre-kindergarten. 17K532 will begin enrolling kindergarten through second grade students in 2013-2014 and will add one grade per year until it has reached full scale and serves students in kindergarten through fifth grade in 2016-2017. 17K532 will also offer a pre-kindergarten program beginning in 2013-2014. SA – Brooklyn 7 will open in September 2013 and will serve 125-160 students in kindergarten and first grade, and would add second grade the following year. SA – Brooklyn 7 will reach full scale in terms of enrollment in 2015-2016 for the K167 building. At that time, SA – Brooklyn 7 will

serve approximately 210-270 students in kindergarten through second grade.

K167 also houses a community-based organization (“CBO”), Brooklyn Psychotherapy, which operates a school-based mental health clinic, and a United Federation of Teachers (“UFT”) office.

If this proposal and the proposal to phase out P.S. 167 are approved, 17K532 will serve the same zone as 17K167 and will admit students based upon standard zoned admissions priorities as described in Chancellor’s Regulation A-101, offering priority to students residing in the current P.S. 167 zone. A student’s zoned school is determined by his or her home address. According to the 2011-2012 Enrollment, Capacity, Utilization Report (“Blue Book”), K167 has a target capacity of 785 students, but in 2012-2013 the building is only serving 450 students,² yielding a building utilization rate of 57%.³ This means that the building is “underutilized” and has space to accommodate additional students.⁴ In 2016-2017, once P.S. 167 has completed its phase-out and 17K532 and SA – Brooklyn 7 are at full scale, it is projected that there will be approximately 641-761 students served in K167, thereby yielding an estimated building utilization rate of approximately 82%-97%. If both this proposal and the proposal to phase-out P.S. 167 are approved, 17K532 will replace the elementary school seats that will be lost as a result of the phase out and eventual closure of P.S. 167 and will provide a new educational option for families in District 17. If the proposal to phase out P.S. 167 is not approved by the Panel for Educational Policy (“PEP”), the DOE would reevaluate this proposal and would either withdraw or revise the proposal.

Background on the DOE’s Decision-Making Process

The DOE strives to ensure that all students in New York City have access to a high quality school at every stage of their education. The opening and co-location of 17K532 in building K167 is intended to provide an additional option to students and families in District 17.

II. Proposed or Potential Use of Building

K167 has the capacity to serve 785 students. (The concept of “target capacity” is explained below.) In 2012-2013, the building is serving 450 students, yielding a building utilization rate of 57%. When P.S. 167 completes its phase-out and 17K532 and SA – Brooklyn 7 have reached full scale, the DOE projects that building K167 will serve approximately 641-761 students and will have an estimated building utilization rate of 82%-97%. This means that, if both proposals are approved, K167 has adequate capacity to accommodate P.S. 167 as it phases out and 17K532 and SA-Brooklyn 7 as they phase in.

If this proposal is approved, 17K532 will open in September 2013 serving approximately 200-230 students in kindergarten through second grade, as well as approximately 36 pre-kindergarten students.⁵ At full scale in 2016-2017, 17K532 will serve approximately 395-455 students in kindergarten through fifth grades, with 36 students in pre-kindergarten.

SA – Brooklyn 7 will open in September 2013 and will serve approximately 125-160 students in kindergarten through first grade.⁶ In 2014-2015, SA – Brooklyn 7 will add second grade and serve approximately 195- 250 students in building K167. At full scale, SA – Brooklyn 7 will serve approximately 210-270 students in kindergarten through second grade in 2015-2016.

If all three proposals are approved, the grade spans for P.S. 167, 17K532, and SA – Brooklyn 7 over a five-year period will be:

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As described in more detail in the Blue Book, which is available at http://www.nycsca.org/Community/CapitalPlanManagementReportsData/Enrollment/2011-2012_Classic.pdf, a building's target utilization rate is calculated by dividing the aggregated enrollment of all the school organizations in the building by the aggregated "target capacities" of those organizations. Each school organization's "target capacity" is calculated based upon the scheduled use of individual rooms as reported by principals during an annual facilities survey, the DOE's standards for goal classroom capacities (which are lower than the United Federation of Teachers contractual class sizes and differ depending on grade level), and the efficiency with which classrooms are programmed (i.e., the frequency with which classes are scheduled in a given classroom).

The most recent year for which target capacity has been calculated for buildings is 2011-2012. As described earlier in this EIS, the DOE's projected utilization rates for the 2013-2014 school year and beyond are based on the 2011-2012 target capacity, which assumes that the components underlying that target capacity (scheduled use of classrooms, goal for maximum classroom capacity, etc.) remain constant. Thus, projected utilization rates for 2013-2014 and beyond provide only an approximation of a building's usage because each of the factors underlying target capacity may be adjusted by principals from year to year to better accommodate students' needs. For example, changing the use of a room from an administrative room to a homeroom at the high school level will increase a building's overall target capacity because for high schools administrative rooms are not assigned a capacity. Holding enrollment constant, this change would result in a lower utilization rate. Similarly, if a room previously used as a kindergarten classroom is subsequently used as a fifth grade classroom, the building's target capacity would increase because we expect that a fifth grade class will have more students than a kindergarten class. This is reflected in the fact that the DOE's goal for maximum classroom capacity is higher for fifth grade classrooms than for kindergarten classrooms. In this example, as well, assuming enrollment is constant, the utilization rate would decrease.

III. Impact of the Proposal on Students, Schools, and the Community

A. Students

Impact on Students Currently Attending School in K167

The proposed co-location of 17K532 in K167 is intended to replace the seats lost by the phase-out and closure of P.S. 167 and to provide a new educational option for District 17 families. SA – Brooklyn 7 will also offer an additional educational option for District 17 families. If the proposal to phase out P.S. 167 is approved, P.S. 167 will be phased out gradually over the next several years and will no longer admit new kindergarten, first-grade, or second-grade students at the end of this school year. Additionally, at the end of this year, P.S. 167 will not offer its pre-kindergarten program. After the 2013-2014 school year, P.S. 167 will no longer enroll third-grade students. After the 2014-2015 school year, P.S. 167 will no longer enroll

fourth-grade students. After the 2015-2016 school year, P.S. 167 will close. The proposal to phase out and eventually close P.S. 167 and its impact on current P.S. 167 students are outlined in a separate EIS available at: <http://schools.nyc.gov/AboutUs/leadership/PEP/publicnotice/2012-2013/Mar112013Proposals.htm>.

During the course of the phase-out of P.S. 167, 17K532 will phase in to K167. If this proposal is approved, in the 2013-2014 school year, 17K532 will serve the kindergarten, first-, and second-grade students who would have otherwise attended P.S. 167 if it were not being phased out. 17K532 will also offer a pre-kindergarten program. 17K532 will then expand one grade each year until it reaches full scale in 2016-2017 and serves students in kindergarten through fifth grades and pre-kindergarten.

Current kindergarten and first grade students at P.S. 167 will be enrolled in 17K532, which will open in September 2013 in K167. Current second-, third-, and fourth-grade students at P.S. 167 will continue to be enrolled in P.S. 167. This includes students in these grades who enter New York City Public Schools during the 2012-2013 school year. Current fifth-grade students should have already applied to middle school via the District 17 Middle School Choice Process. If they do not meet promotional standards, in which case they will continue fifth grade at P.S. 167. Current pre-kindergarten students at P.S. 167 will have priority for kindergarten admissions at 17K532 in 2013-2014.

While P.S. 167 is phasing out, there may be students who do not meet promotional standards and are required to repeat a grade that P.S. 167 will no longer serve. These students will be enrolled in 17K532 in the grade which the student is repeating. This applies to current second-grade students in 2012-2013, third-grade students in 2013-2014, fourth-grade students in 2014-2015, and fifth-grade students in 2015-2016.

P.S. 167 currently offers Integrated Co-Teaching (“ICT”) classes, self-contained (“SC”) special education classes, and Special Education Teacher Support Services (“SETSS”). It also has an English as a Second Language (“ESL”) program for ELL students. Current students will be able to continue in their existing ICT and SC classes and SETSS will continue to be provided as P.S. 167 phases out. Students with disabilities will continue to receive mandated services in accordance with their Individualized Education Programs (“IEPs”). Current ELL students will also continue to receive mandated services as the school phases out.

According to the P.S. 167 school Web site, the school currently offers the following special academic programs, activities and partnerships:⁸

This proposal will not prevent P.S. 167 from continuing to offer any of these options, but the number and range of programs offered may gradually diminish due to declining student enrollment as the school phases out. Again, it is difficult to predict precisely how those changes might be implemented as decisions will rest with school administrators and will be made based on student interests and available resources. That is true for any City school as all schools modify extra-curricular offerings annually based on student demand and available resources.

Impact on Future Elementary School Students in District 17

P.S. 167 is a zoned elementary school. A student's zoned school is determined by his or her home address. For more information about school zoning and admissions processes to enroll in a zoned elementary school, please visit the DOE Web site: <http://schools.nyc.gov/choicesenrollment/elementary>.

In this EIS, the DOE is proposing to open a new zoned elementary school in building K167 which is intended to better serve the needs of the community and replace the seats lost by the phase-out of P.S. 167. If this proposal is approved and the proposal to phase out P.S. 167 is approved, P.S. 167 will no longer admit new kindergarten students beginning in the 2013-2014 school year. 17K532 will open and serve zoned students who would have otherwise attended P.S. 167.

Zoned schools are obligated to serve all students residing in their zone, space permitting, regardless of when families show up to register. Applicants must be admitted to zoned schools in the following order of priority:

- a. Zoned students whose verified siblings are pre-registered or enrolled at the time of application submission and will be enrolled in grades K-5 in the school at the start of the following school year in September;
- b. Zoned students other than those in (a) above applying to the zoned school;

If space allows, and if the Office of Student Enrollment deems appropriate based on district needs, offers may be authorized for the following priority groups, in the below order. Only the Office of Student Enrollment may authorize the placement of non-zoned students out of this priority order; for example, for students who cannot be accommodated at their zoned school, or for special programs such as dual-language or inclusion classes for students with Autism Spectrum Disorders.

- c. Students whose verified siblings are pre-registered or enrolled at the time of application submission and will be enrolled in grades K-5 in the school at the start of the following school year in September who are not zoned to the school but are residents of that district;
- d. Students whose verified siblings are pre-registered or enrolled at the time of application submission and will be enrolled in grades K-5 at the start of the following school year in September who are residents of another district;
- e. Students currently attending the school's pre-kindergarten program who reside outside the school's zone but in the school's district, without a sibling who will be in grades K-5 at the school in the following school year;
- f. Students currently attending the school's pre-kindergarten program who reside outside the school's zone and district, without a sibling who will be in grades K-5 at the school in the following school year;

- g. Students other than those in (c) and (e) above who are residents of that district; and
- h. Students other than those in (d) and (f) who are residents of another district.

Students with IEPs, with the exception of those recommending placement in a District 75 school, are admitted to schools in the same manner as general education students. Schools will create programs that meet the needs of all students, ensuring students with IEPs access to learn alongside their non-disabled peers to the greatest extent possible.

In accordance with DOE policy, ELL students will also be admitted to elementary schools in the same manner as their peers who are not ELL students. Any students requiring ELL services will continue to receive appropriate services at the school.

SA – Brooklyn 7 will accept students through the charter lottery process. If this proposal is approved, elementary age students in District 17 will have the opportunity to enter the charter application lottery process to enroll in SA – Brooklyn 7 starting in April of 2013. SA – Brooklyn 7 provides the following lottery preferences: (1) siblings of current or accepted students, (2) English Language Learner (“ELL”) students, and (3) applicants who reside within the Community School District (“CSD”) in which the school is located.

SA – Brooklyn 7 sets aside a certain percentage of seats for ELL students that is relatable to the average ELL percentage at a traditional public elementary school within the City and/or District 17. With respect to the remaining seats and the waitlist, SA – Brooklyn 7 provides a lottery preference to applicants who reside within the CSD.

More information about SA – Brooklyn 7’s lottery process and its impact on future elementary students in District 17 can be found in the proposal to co-locate SA – Brooklyn 7 in building K167. Impact on Future Pre-Kindergarten Students

If the proposal to open and co-locate 17K532 is approved, 17K532 will offer a pre-kindergarten program equivalent to the one currently offered at P.S. 167. The DOE anticipates that the new school will offer two sections (a total of 36 seats) of a full-day pre-kindergarten program.

Incoming pre-kindergarten students can apply to the pre-kindergarten program through the centralized pre-kindergarten admissions process. Verified siblings of students enrolled at either 17K532 or P.S. 167 will have first priority for admission to the pre-kindergarten program at 17K532. Students who reside in the current P.S. 167 zone who do not have siblings enrolled at either 17K532 or P.S. 167 will have second priority for admission. As with all pre-kindergarten programs, the availability of the program that will be offered at 17K532 will be subject to continued funding availability and demand.

B. Schools

Building K167 has the capacity to accommodate 17K532 as P.S. 167 phases out and 17K532 and SA – Brooklyn 7 phases in. In 2016-2017, once P.S. 167 has phased out and 17K532 and SA – Brooklyn 7 have reached full scale, there will be approximately 641-761 total students served in the building. The projected utilization for K167 at that point is approximately 82%-97%.

The estimated enrollment for the existing and proposed organizations in K167 over a five-year period is shown below:⁹

SA – Brooklyn 7 pursuant to the Citywide Instructional Footprint (the “Footprint”) while P.S. 167 phases out and 17K532 and SA – Brooklyn 7 phases in. The Footprint sets forth the baseline number of rooms that should be allocated to a school based on the grade levels served by the school and number of classes per grade. For existing schools, the Footprint is applied to the current number of sections per grade, assuming class size will remain constant. A representative from the Office of Space Planning then confirms both the baseline and current space allocation totals during a walk-through of the building, where he/she is accompanied by a school’s representative.

For elementary schools serving grades kindergarten through five (and for all pre-kindergarten programs), the Footprint assumes that classes are self-contained. Therefore, the Footprint allocates one full-size room for each general education or ICT section and a full-size or half-size room to accommodate each SC special education section served by the school. In addition to these rooms, schools serving grades kindergarten through five receive an allocation of cluster or specialty rooms proportionate to the number of students enrolled. These spaces can be used at the principal’s discretion for purposes such as art and/or music instruction, among other things.

The Footprint allocates the number of baseline rooms for student support services, resources rooms, and administrative space based on the grades a school serves and its enrollment at scale. As in other situations where schools are co-located, the schools would need to share large common and specialty rooms in the building, such as the cafeteria, the gymnasium, and the library. Specific decisions regarding the allocation of the shared spaces will be made by the Building Council, consisting of principals from all co-located schools, in conjunction with the DOE’s Office of Space Planning.

As discussed above, the DOE has also proposed to co-locate SA-Brooklyn 7 with 17K532 and P.S. 167 in K167 beginning in the 2013-2014 school year. Along with that EIS, the DOE has also posted a Building Utilization Plan (“BUP”) that describes in more detail that there will be sufficient instructional space in K167 to co-locate 17K532 and SA – Brooklyn 7 with P.S. 167 during the time both schools phase in and P.S. 167 phases out. As in other situations where schools are co-located, the schools would need to share large common and specialty rooms in the building, such as the cafeteria, the gymnasium, and the library. Specific decisions regarding the allocation of the shared spaces will be made by the Building Council, consisting of principals from all co-located schools, in conjunction with the DOE’s Office of Space Planning. A Shared Space Committee will also meet a minimum of four times a year and report back to the Building Council regarding the BUP and the scheduling of shared spaces. C. Community

P.S. 167 has struggled with low performance despite the considerable support that the DOE has offered to the school. As a result, there is a need to provide a better option for families in the community. Under this proposal, K167 will remain open, but will offer a new educational option that is intended to better support the learning needs of future elementary school students in District 17.

The DOE is proposing to open a new zoned elementary school in K167, which is intended to better serve the needs of the community and replace the seats lost by the phase-out of P.S. 167. P.S. 167 is the only elementary school in District 17 that the DOE has proposed to phase out this year.

Impact on Brooklyn Psychotherapy and the UFT Office

If this proposal is approved, the DOE does not anticipate that Brooklyn Psychotherapy or the UFT office will be affected by P.S. 167's phase-out or 17K532's phase-in, and that both will continue to operate in K167.

This proposal is not expected to impact the ability of community members and organizations to obtain school building use permits at K167. This proposal is also not expected to impact the site accessibility of K167.

V. Initial Impact on Budget and Cost of Instruction

New district schools are provided with a fixed per-school allocation and a variable per-pupil Other Than Personal Services (“OTPS”) allocation of funds to cover start-up costs. Based on current one-time allocations for new schools, 17K532 will receive a fixed allocation of \$80,000 and approximately \$92,276-\$104,006 in new school OTPS start-up per-pupil allocations during its first year.¹⁹

In addition, 17K532’s basic operating budget will be determined by the Fair Student Funding (“FSF”) formula used at all other New York City district public schools. Under FSF, schools receive City tax levy funding on a per-pupil basis. Each student receives a per-pupil entitlement based on the grade level of the student.

VI. Effect on Personnel Needs, Costs of Instruction, Administration, Transportation and Other Support Services

A. Personnel Needs

17K532 will need to hire additional teachers during each year of the grade expansion as the total number of students enrolled in the school increases over each of the next four years. The precise number of positions needed for the 2013-2014 school year will be determined once annual enrollment projections are released in the spring of 2013. Similarly, the number of new positions created to serve students in kindergarten through fifth grade will be determined based on annual enrollment projections available as the school grows to serve those grades.

New schools follow the hiring process consistent with the procedures set forth in the collective bargaining agreement between the DOE and UFT. Where a new school's hiring has an impact on a school that is closing or phasing out, the new school shall be required to hire no less than 50% of the most senior qualified staff from the closing or phasing out school, if a sufficient number of staff apply, until the impacted school is closed.

New administrative staff and non-pedagogical positions will be created at 17K532 over the course of the school's phase-in. 17K532 is expected to hire additional administrative and non-pedagogical staff as each new grade is added.

B. Administration

17K532 may hire school supervisors and/or administrative personnel on an as-needed basis throughout the course of the school's phase-in.

C. Transportation

There will be no change to existing transportation practices at P.S. 167 throughout the phase-in of 17K532 and SA – Brooklyn 7 and P.S. 167's phase-out.
