Recent accomplishments include coming off the SURR list and for the past two years I.S. 49 students have scored higher than ever before on the City and State test with students at grade level or higher.

### Special Academic Programs

I.S 49's priority is to implement all aspects of the workshop model in all academic content areas. Every grade will have an active participation of the uniformed Balanced Literacy Program. This school's special academic program has peer tutoring. We have established a youth counseling program continuing academic services in reading and math.

### Extracurricular Activities

As a team we are dedicated to provide the educational process through the creation of extracurricular activities.

Non-academic activities included: Basketball, volleyball and track teams; conflict resolution program involving students (a youth counseling group), and an arts enrichment & dance program.

### Community Support

Our collaboration with different Community Based Organizations (CBO's) is ongoing and will serve as a resource/support system. We have partnerships with Brooklyn Psychiatric Center, Brooklyn North Development Corp., and Woodhull Hospital; and support from the Attendance Improvement Dropout Prevention program.

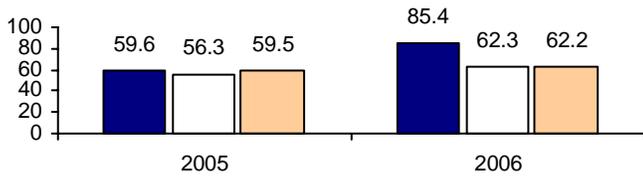

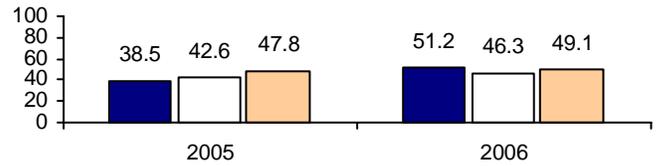

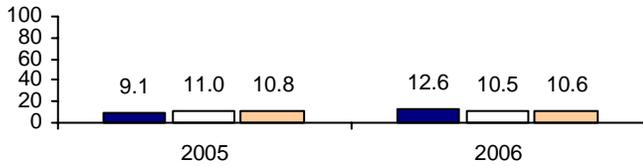
**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**



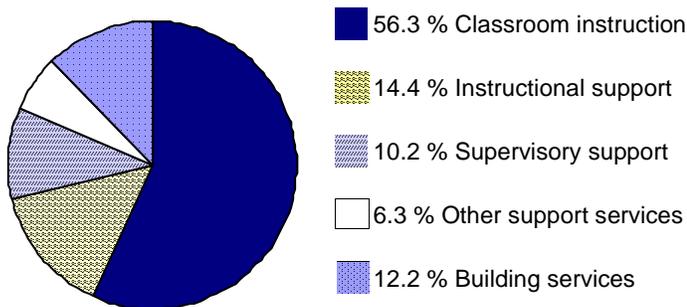
