#### Principal's Statement

Juan Morel Campos Secondary School 71 prides itself on the high standards maintained by our students and staff. The moderate size of our school allows us to personalize the educational process. Our students are encouraged to excel in academics, as well as in other areas important to their development. Our excellent band, chorus, and fine arts programs allow our students to develop their talents. Our library/media center is the heart of our literacy/technology programs. Students have an opportunity to explore their world through print and digital media.

#### Special Academic Programs

We offer double period math and English Language Arts in grades 6-9 as well as a full complement of art and music classes. We offer intervention and enrichment per student need. We have also been approved for a new, state of the art science lab that should be completed by the fall of 2007.

#### Extracurricular Activities

The school has clubs for robotics, music, chess, the performing and fine arts. Through Project Arts, students take trips to cultural institutions throughout the city. Sports and Arts in the Schools and the Leadership Program work with students in an after school program, providing instruction in dance, basketball, conflict resolution and leadership.

#### Community Support

Family Dynamics maintains an office in the school and provides after school activities for students five days a week. We also have a close relationship with local artists who bring our students to their galleries for visits and workshops. In addition, a number of students attend Medgar Evers College and the Pratt Institute.

#### Parent/School Support

Parent involvement workshops provide assistance to parents in the areas of high school and college selection, parenting skills, and health issues. We also have math and literacy evenings to showcase what is happening in the classrooms. We offer ESL and computer education for parents.






**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**




