### School Mission Statement

*The mission of MS 88 is to establish small learning communities of lifelong learners who will experience success by receiving personalized attention that remains beyond the scope of traditional schools. We have created an environment that allows our students to respect themselves and their abilities. Our aim is to give students the necessary emotional and academic support to build their self-esteem by setting high expectations that will lead to a sense of personal responsibility.*

### Principal's Statement

M.S. 88 is committed to creating an environment that supports all of its students on their educational journey. Upon entry into the school, students are placed into small thematic houses where they will remain for their three years, forming close, caring and supportive relationships with teachers and fellow students. M.S. 88 is organized and structured to respond to the needs of our adolescent learners by providing them with academic and real life learning experiences. We also promote inquiry-based learning in all subject areas and the development of critical thinking, problem solving and research skills.

### Special Academic Programs

M.S. 88 has implemented a school structure based on vertical, theme-based houses (School for Medical & Health Careers, School for Integrated Studies Through The Arts, School of Media Arts, Research & Technology). Students will take part in a rigorous academic program enhanced by the themes of the houses.

### Extracurricular Activities

M.S. 88 is committed to providing schoolwide enrichment activities for all students. The school currently has two major grants, a 21st Century Community Learning Ctr. grant and a Title VII Big Apple grant, that support both academic intervention and enrichment activities. Activities include: N.Y. Academy of Medicine Fellows, Art, Dance, etc.

### Community Support

We have partnerships with Big Brothers and Big Sisters NYC, Project Reach Youth; The Brooklyn Museum, Junior Achievement, Maimonides Internship Prog., Theatre for Young Audience, Brooklyn Conservatory of Music, Roadrunners Club and the Shadow Program.





## TEACHERS


**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**




