School Mission Statement

We believe that all children can and will achieve their potential and become productive, literate, responsible citizens. In order to accomplish this, we have developed a program of interdisciplinary instruction, working with the staff, parents, and community to provide intensive instruction and enrichment in every area for all our students, enabling these youngsters to meet and exceed the city, state and school standards.

Principal's Statement

The Bay Academy for the Arts and Sciences is an innovation in middle-level education, which provides an accelerated instructional environment emphasizing the arts and sciences and interdisciplinary connections among subject areas. Students from throughout the city are admitted on the basis of examination and previous record. Field trips, hands-on experimentation, and special speakers are an integral part of our curriculum. Among our special talent areas are art, athletics, instrumental and vocal music, drama, computer math, creative writing, science, and dance. The students' achievements in reading and math are among the top in the city.

Special Academic Programs

Regents-level Math; Regents-level Earth Science; Foreign Language Proficiency exams; special talent concentrations for each student; computer labs; computers in the classroom; interdisciplinary programs in every grade.

Extracurricular Activities

Arista, Archon, Drama Group, Jazz Band, Chorus, Set Design workshops, Econ Bowl team, New York Junior Tennis League, Pen Pal program with sister school in Zimbabwe, Builders Club, Champs athletic teams, Math team, Urban Advantage, and Greenhouse.

Community Support

We work with the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Jazz at Lincoln center, Brooklyn Arts Council (CASA) Noble Maritime at Snug Harbor, and other arts organizations as a Project ARTS School. An intensive study of immigration with NPNH at Fort Wadsworth began this year. Our Builders Club (Kiwanis) and Arista and Archon honor societies are very active.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




