Principal's Statement

The William A. Butler School is a small child centered learning environment where every youngster is nurtured and encouraged to reach his/her full potential. We use a balanced literacy model to help our students become great communicators who are skillful readers and writers who can clearly articulate their thoughts. Our youngsters learn math through a hands-on workshop approach. We are a "Comer" school where the growth of the whole child is of paramount importance. Through a partnership with our parents we work to ensure that our students develop social and academic intelligence as well as emotional and physical maturity.

Special Academic Programs

Our academic program is supported by our state of the art Computer Laboratory, Project Smart Computer Learning Centers, a strong Pre-Kindergarten Program, Hands-on Science and math activities, parent workshops and an Early Childhood (Pre-K-Grade 3) Program. There is an Inclusion Class on each grade through Grade 5.

Extracurricular Activities

Our before and afterschool programs include Project Arts; Student Government programs; strong indoor and outdoor physical education programs, Peer Mediation, Conflict Resolution, School Safety Patrol, Extended Day Programs and Educational Summit. The Annual Cinco de Mayo Festival and Black History Programs celebrate our multi-ethnic heritage.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




