Public School 169, as a Sunset Park neighborhood school, believes that all children are capable of achieving excellence and reaching high standards. We will provide engaging professional and parental development to support our instructional program. We are dedicated to creating lifelong learners who will become productive members of our society.

### Principal's Statement

P.S. 169 serves a culturally diverse student population. Over 1/3 of our children are ELLs. Our standards based educational plan includes balanced math and balanced literacy. This includes a 90-minute literacy block and a 60-minute math block. Teachers, integrate technology, science, social studies and the arts into classroom instruction. Our academic progress over recent years has been most attributed to the willingness of our staff to participate in professional development endeavors and work together to improve instruction. Our theme: do not let a child go through the school anonymously.

### Special Academic Programs

Special Academic Programs include: Project Arts, AUSSIE Consultant, Title I Reading and Math, RCCP, Academic Intervention Services, At Risk SETTs, At Risk Speech, reduced class size grades 1-3, Self contained ESL classes K-5, Extended Day grades 2-5, Saturday Academy grades 3-5, Special Time grades K-5.

Extra Curricular activities include: Virtual Y, Violence Prevention, Upper Grade Literacy, Math Enrichment, Computer Club, Fine Arts Club, Dance Club, Chorus, Literature Circles and lunchtime clubs.






**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**




