### School Mission Statement

### Principal's Statement

Our elementary school has 846 students attending Pre-K-5. There are 29 General Education classes, 2 half-day pre-kindergartens, and 5 special education self contained classes. In addition, we have 5 collaborative team teaching classes in grades K-5 which combines general education and special education students in a successful LRE model. Parents are integrally involved in school planning through our active PTA, School Leadership Team and efforts of our Parent Coordinator. We are part of the city wide Children First initiative implementing Balanced Literacy and Everyday Math in Grades K-5. We are a Teachers College Project School.

### Special Academic Programs

Balanced Literacy, Everyday Math, Teachers College Writing, Project Arts, Reading Recovery, Leveled Literacy Intervention, Academic Academy Afterschool Program, Saturday Science Academy, ESL through Music and Saturday Academies, Computer Lab and wireless laptop carts.

### Extracurricular Activities

Band, chorus, recorder, violin, Peaceful Playgrounds, Student Council, field day, community service events (parades, performances at senior centers, toy drives, coat drives, canned food drives, etc.) poster and essay contests, ballroom dancing and international dance programs enhance our curriculum as they are linked with academic disciplines.

### Community Support

TASC Grant providing the Neighborhood Improvement Association-One World After School Program; Learning Leaders Program, Dyker Park Alliance, City Councilmen, State Senator, Assemblymen and Congressmen all collaborate with us providing various initiatives, including Summer Reading Initiatives, to enhance learning and improve school operation.

### Parent/School Support

Parents and staff work closely on the School Leadership Team, parent workshops, parent newsletter and annual student yearbook featuring students' writing. We are recipients of a Parents as Partners grant that enables us to offer Adult Ballroom Dance Classes to our parents. We hold Adult ESL classes once a week.






**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**




