The Sheffield School is committed to provide a safe, positive and nurturing learning environment. ### Special Academic Programs

The Arts at PS190K were established to serve as the pulse of the school. The focused areas are what constitutes, the Performing Arts: Music and The Visual Arts. The current music teacher possesses a common branch license and a music license. Students in grades k- 5 receive violin instruction in the Arts.

### Extracurricular Activities

At lunchtime, students participate in special programs such as: "Games Kids Should Play at Recess". These programs provide a focus on social skills, behavior, and as well, develops school community amongst all constituents. Special music gym clubs also meet during lunchtime.






**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**




