Principal's Statement

John Wilson Intermediate School 211 provides each student a diverse education in a safe, supportive environment that promotes self-discipline, motivation and excellence in learning. We rank in the top 10% of the highest performing middle schools on the 2004-2005 Eighth Grade New York State Assessments in Mathematics. We rank in the top 15% of all middle, elementary and K-8 schools in New York City and New York State Assessments in English Language Arts for 2004-2005.

Special Academic Programs

The core philosophy of the gifted and talented program is the SEM model. The basic objective is to provide enrichment to all the students in diverse subject areas. Students will receive additional instruction in academics (advance classes such as Math A Prep, Spanish Proficiency Regents, Earth Science Regents and Technology).

Extracurricular Activities

Students participate in Intramural sports, peer mediation and an extended day program in reading, math, drama, dance, poetry, art and chess.

Community Support

We have ongoing collaborations with the Brooklyn Museum, Women National Basketball Association, Sports and Arts Foundation, Brooklyn Center for the Urban Environment, The Leadership Club and our Television Studio provide school news to the entire community through the production of programs for broadcast over Channels 25 (WNYE) and 67 (BCAT).






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




