P.S. 312 maintains high academic standards. We have implemented a number of programs to ensure success. These programs include the Writing Process, SCIS-a hands-on Science Program and a Music Program. An exciting aspect to the school is the adjacent Environmental Science Center, a state of the art Science facility used throughout the region. P.S. 312 is clearly in the forefront of scientific technology and our students are being prepared for the 21st Century.

### Special Academic Programs

Our special programs include: Balanced Literacy Program; Early Literacy Center; Pre-Kindergarten Superstart PLUS; Collaborative Team Teaching; SCIS Science Program; Laptop Program and a Project Arts Grant, which includes residencies with Rockaway Artists Alliance, TDF, and the South Street Seaport.

### Extracurricular Activities

Activities included through our Violence Prevention Program (a SAPIS Grant) are basketball, volleyball, and tennis. Chorus, dance, and band classes are provided. 




**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**




