School Mission Statement

Midwood High School at Brooklyn College is a four-year comprehensive high school, which has a longstanding tradition of academic excellence and community service. The three houses which constitute the school's instructional program, the Medical Science Institute, the Humanities Program and the Collegiate Program, prepare all students for Regents diplomas, and college study. Equally important is the goal to instill in all students the Midwood Core Values - Respect, Responsibility and Honesty. We encourage our students to grow in mind and body and challenge them to serve the community. The student population of Midwood High School reflects our urban community, and we instill in our students an appreciation of diverse ethnic and cultural heritages. Our goal is to have students function better in a multicultural society with a respect for human diversity.

Principal's Statement

America's highest educational award was presented to Midwood High School when the U.S. Department of Education declared our school a BLUE RIBBON SECONDARY SCHOOL OF EXCELLENCE. Our Advanced Placement program is unique and was recognized by Educational Testing Services in their annual report. The 2005 graduating class was awarded over \$28,000,000 in college scholarships. Ninety-nine percent of the 2005 graduating class is in college. Midwood is on the cutting-edge of computer technology; Internet services are available in classrooms, the library and all offices. Newsweek selected Midwood as one of the nation's outstanding secondary schools.

Special Academic Programs

Advanced Placement program in 14 academic areas; a gifted and talented honors program in medical science and humanities; peer tutoring; an extensive research program in the natural and social sciences; a unique instrumental and vocal music program.

Extracurricular Activities

Thirty-eight non-athletic clubs and activities, e.g., student government, marching band, Asian Society, Black Heritage Alliance, chorus, band, peer mediation, SING, concerts, conflict resolution, art, drama and math clubs. 20+ varsity/J.V. teams including football, lacrosse, baseball, track, tennis, swim.

We have these partnerships: Brooklyn College, NYS Arts Council, MOMA, Theatre for a New Audience and the Gilder-Lehrman Foundation. Through a community grant, a state-of-the art television studio is located at Midwood High School.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




