School Mission Statement

Our vision is to provide our students with the academic, social and emotional skills necessary for success in their future careers and family lives. Principal's Statement

East New York Family Academy is a 6 through 12 Middle/High School. We provide our students with the resources necessary for admission into a four-year college. Our College Now and Advanced Placement Programs offers students the opportunity to take courses for college credit. Students also have the opportunity to participate in a variety of community service projects and internships in law, health, finance, and technology. We offer elective sequences in computer maintenance, computer networking, instrumental music, voice, dance, fine arts, and law. All students are assigned to a small advisory that sponsors a community service project each semester.

Special Academic Programs

Our College Now and Advanced Placement Programs support rigorous instruction and individual college advisement. Saturday Academy and our extended day program provide additional test prep, tutorials, and courses for credit. All incoming middle school students are offered free desktop computers with internet capabilities for use in their homes.

Extracurricular Activities

We offer PSAL Varsity sport programs for boys and girls in Basketball and Volleyball. We also offer intramural swimming, tennis, bowling, and handball. Students may also participate in college tours, college and career fairs, out of state trips, and our winter and spring shows that include performances by our dance, drama and stepping programs.

Community Support

Brooklyn College provides student and teacher workshops, and classroom tutors. Our teachers provide classroom training for student teaching interns from Brooklyn College. Computers For Youth provides computers for our Middle School Students for home use. Social Work Interns from NYU provide additional counseling services.

Parent/School Support

Our parent coordinator facilitates workshops for parents on a variety of relevant topics. We also offer school-wide open houses and orientations in the spring and fall; quarterly meetings with Special Needs staff and parents, school performances in the fall and spring; bi-monthly leadership team meetings, and monthly PTA meetings.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




