Special Academic Programs

Our ELA, Special Education, and ELL departments have been working with Teacher's College Reading and Writing Workshop to match students to their appropriate level books and increase volume of reading and writing. We provide students with Test Preparation 4 days a week for their state exams. We also offer after-school tutoring 4 days a week.

Extracurricular Activities

Activities include: East Harlem Tutorial Learning Extension; an after-school and Saturday tutoring; Girls Inc., LEAP, Leadership Program, and Periwinkle; we offer video, mural painting, Rap/Poetry, drama, intramural and district-league basketball, cheerleading, step, cooking, drumming, floor hockey, yearbook, and peer leadership to name a few.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




