At East Side Middle School (ESMS), we help our students come to think of themselves as apprentices in their fields. We want our students studying biology, archaeology, math, or historical fiction to develop the habits of mind of biologists, archaeologists, mathematicians or novelists. We help our students develop the questioning techniques, rules of evidence, craft, language and grammar of their respective professions.

Principal's Statement

The goal of ESMS is to provide a middle school experience that combines a vibrant, rigorous academic experience within a nurturing, compassionate environment. Learning is most often collaborative and project-based. To support the individual needs of our students, ESMS offers a weekly advisory program for 6th graders and a school-wide electives program that personalize a student's experience. Grade teachers meet weekly to address the concerns of specific students. Every member of our staff is looked upon as a resource to every one of our children. Above all else, we strive to create a feeling of an inclusive community of learners.

Special Academic Programs

ESMS is a school for academically accelerated students. Professional mentors play a strong role in our academic program and include science and math fellows, theater and film professionals, and published authors. Academic programs include Constitution Works, Facing History, and the Model UN. The school has mobile, wireless computer labs.

Extracurricular Activities

A Broadway theatre and acting club; crafts programs; art portfolio; cartooning; guitar; media studies; football and soccer; chess; HS prep; after school sports, dance and music programs.

Community Support

We have a myriad of partnerships, including: Asphalt Green Inc., Arts Connection, Young People's Chorus, Lenox Hill Hospital, Cornell Medical School, Columbia University, Learning Leaders, Model UN, UNICEF, the New York Public Library, private individuals, and support from the NYC School Volunteers program.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




