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Principal's Statement

MTW is an intimate District 2 school whose classes reflect the mosaic that is NYC, in an atmosphere that respects and reflects diversity. Social studies core curriculum supports standards while nurturing thoughtful, curious learners. Beyond core studies, the school day includes the literacy block and constructivist math, with weekly enrichments comprising music, technology, hands-on science, gym, chorus and Orff music. The staff continually strives to meet children's individualized needs.

Bank St. College and Aussie provide ongoing professional development. Our SLT, composed of parents, teachers, and principal, advises on school policy.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




