We begin foreign language in grade 6. Students take language proficiency exams in grade 8. At the same time we pride ourselves on our interdisciplinary grade teams of teachers who are well able to differentiate instruction. This allows us to offer creative, provocative courses while maintaining a full inclusion program which is a Collaborative Team Teaching model.

In the area of compassion, the Lab School M412 11th and 12th graders run advisory classes for the middle school students and model community service, a requirement in our 8th grade.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




