#### School Mission Statement

*The Coalition School for Social Change is a small community of learners whose primary goal is to provide a challenging academic and personalized environment that nurtures our students' intellectual potential and social awareness. We strive to prepare students to meet personal goals, pursue further education, and begin meaningful careers. By combining strong academic preparation with social commitment, our students graduate as lifelong learners who will contribute to the development of a democratic and humanistic society.*

#### Principal's Statement

The primary goal of our academic program is to provide a challenging and personalized learning environment which facilitates critical and evaluative thinking. Utilizing our community resources and school partnerships, we emphasize college preparation and career awareness from grade 9. For a diploma, we require the completion of all coursework, satisfactory performance on standardized tests, and participation in an exit interview process. Working with varied private, city and state agencies, students participate in a Community Service Program. All students are given mentors and advisors for their high school careers.

#### Special Academic Programs

Interdisciplinary curriculum, reduced class size, computer technology integration, advisory, A.P. U.S. Government classes, school newspaper, SAT and Regents prep, elective classes, Community Service, Project Arts, College Now Program partnership with Hunter College, instrumental jazz music program, extensive use of NYC cultural resources.

#### Extracurricular Activities

Boys and Girls PSAL Bowling and Basketball Teams, after school clubs, tutoring and homework help, Conflict Resolution Program, student government, Model U.N.

#### Community Support

Collaboration with Hunter College, John J Talent Search college advisement, Midori Foundation in collaboration with Bette Midler's Jeckyl Foundation.

The PA meets monthly, with workshops conducted by the Parent Coordinator and community partners. Parents participate fully on the School Leadership Team and contribute to the formation of the School's Comprehensive Educational Plan. 




**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**




