School Mission Statement

The mission of Chelsea Campus High School is to provide an environment that nurtures and values each individual, and that expands the intellectual, social, and physical capabilities of all students. By providing academic intervention services, career-informed courses and work-based learning experiences, we believe that each student, upon graduation, will have a marketable skill as well as the qualifications to attend college if he/she desires. Each of our Small Learning Communities centers instruction around its Career and Technical Education sequence. Our vision includes classrooms that embrace student-centered learning. Our teachers are well versed in Project-based learning, cooperative learning, collaborative learning and the workshop model.

Principal's Statement

Chelsea's three Small Learning Communities, SOHO Business Academy, Soho Communication Arts Academy and Chelsea Technical Academy are currently in their third year of existence. These SLC's finished their first year (2004-2005) with a flourish. The freshman pass rate increased from 53% to 71%. Each of our SLC's are academic in nature and will prepare our students for a strong college career. In addition each student will leave the Chelsea campus with a strong understanding of one of three fields of study: Business Information Processing and Marketing, Communication Arts, or C-tech, Cisco or A++ training.

Special Academic Programs

Computerized instruction in each of our programs. Mentoring/partnership programs with the following: Morgan Stanley, ACE Mentoring, Junior Achievement, Construction Skills 2000, New York City Transit Authority, Center for Arts Education, etc. We have an active College Now program, offering Speech Writing, Sociology, Statistics, etc.

Extracurricular Activities

During the 2004-2005 school year Chelsea students were members of 15 PSAL teams. There is an active student council that planned and executed an array of activities for students throughout the year. Our clubs include FBLA, chess, drama, college, public speaking, art, music, computer and environment and many more.

Community Support

We have many partnerships including: Directions for Our Youth, Morgan Stanley, Eyebeam Atelier, Center for the Arts, New York City Transit Authority and Construction Skills 2000, The Door, City Kids. Our Advisory Council includes the School-to-Work Alliance, the NYS Department of Labor and several community businesses.

Parent/School Support

Chelsea High School has an active Parents Association which meets once a month. There are eight parents on the Leadership Team. Currently the Parent Association is developing classes for Parents to be taken at the high school. We have a new parent coordinator who is helping us bridge the gap between the teachers and the parents.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




