This community aims to cultivate a love of learning in all its members.

Principal's Statement

The school has an interdisciplinary and project-based curriculum. The staff has designed the curriculum to have 9-10 week studies on a unit so that our students can truly grapple with and reflect upon concepts, skills, and content. Teachers plan curriculum together and think deeply about what essential understandings we want our students to master in each study, and how we will support and assess them in reaching these understandings.

Special Academic Programs

The school has an advisory system to help our students examine early adolescent issues and build good decision-making skills within a supportive environment. In addition, Tompkins Square Middle School has electives, which meet twice a week for 8-10 weeks. The electives range from theater, to technology, to community service, to carpentry.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School
