School Mission Statement

At Central Park East II, we believe that children learn through active exploration. We strive to create activity-rich classrooms with high expectations, in which children have multiple ways in which they can show their interests and understandings. Our goal is a community where children are confident problem solvers and risk takers, and where all members of the community have a role in making decisions about curriculum and learning.

Principal's Statement

Opened in the fall of 1980, CPE II has created a caring environment in which children can excel academically and artistically with confidence. Through daily reading, writing and math workshops, children become confident readers, writers and mathematicians. Science and Social Studies are woven in through activities, trips, reading, writing and the arts. The arts play a central role in CPE II. Every student has weekly music, movement and art instruction. Everybody, including students and teachers is on a first-name basis. The entire CPE II gathers in a weekly Community Meeting to share music, stories-just about anything that children are involved with.

Special Academic Programs

Each day includes "Worktime," a CPE II institution in which an hour is devoted to study/practice inspired by student interests. It is not unusual to find upper grade students creating phenomenal structures with blocks, Kapla or Lego. Choices are given wherever possible. Teachers provide materials and guide students as they develop their own ideas.

Extracurricular Activities

CPE II programs include violin, dance, video, percussion ensemble and choir.

Community Support

CPE II enhances its school day program through several organizations: OPUS118 which provides violin instruction, ArtsConnection through which students receive dance instruction, Asphalt Green provides swimming instruction and IPTAR through which many students receive on-site counseling services.

Parent/School Support

Parents play an active and important role at CPE II. With both an active PA and SLT, parents initiate many activities, such as festivals, workshops and volunteer days. The PA has a parent newsletter. Lots of communication flows between home and school, including a weekly family newsletter.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




