School Mission Statement

The mission of P.S. 36 has been, and continues to be, to provide optimum learning opportunities to all our students—at risk, on and above grade level, talented and gifted, newly arrived, and special education. Through these partnerships, our students receive whole class, small group, and individual instruction during the day, after school, and on Saturdays. Our interdisciplinary approach to curriculum and standards driven instruction form the educational foundation for our students, thus preparing them for the intellectual, emotional, and social challenges of the future.

Principal's Statement

One of our school's main goals is to provide a positive learning experience for our students and parents. Through our partnership with Teachers' College, intensive Professional Development workshops enable our teachers to learn, practice, and incorporate successful teaching in their classrooms. Our ongoing assessment tests allow our at-risk students to be targeted and placed in programs that meet their individual needs.

Special Academic Programs

Special academic programs include: Small group early childhood intervention (Reading); after school Literacy and Math intervention; Cha Rosa After School Program; 5th Grade Saturday Academy for Reading, Creative Writing, and Hands-on Math instruction; and daily math AIS block time.

Extracurricular Activities

As part of our after school program, our students can participate in several clubs. Our clubs include: Drama, Ballroom Dance, Learn-to-Swim Program, Step Dance, Chorus, Soccer, and Computer.

Community Support

We are fortunate to have the continued support of several community organizations including the St. Albans Civic Association, St. Albans Christ the Martyr Church, St. Albans Public Library, Zen Masters, Boys and Girls Scouts, and Cha Rosa Foundation. These organizations enable our students to further develop their academic and social skills.

Parent workshops are presented each month to help our parents better understand and help their children in the core curriculum areas, test preparation, meeting State Performance Standards, and Parent/Child Quality Reading Time.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




