The focus is on the integration of the arts in the social studies curriculum with an itinerary that combines the study of literature, art, dance, and music from the indigenous peoples of the regions being studied. School-wide literacy programs include reading incentive projects and additional activities to promote improved literacy. Our collaborations include the N.Y. Philharmonic Partnership Program; Teachers College; St. Jude Children's Hospital; "Music and The Brain" - music literacy keyboarding program; and the Parents as Arts Partners Program.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




