### Principal's Statement

The Thomas J. McCann Woodside Intermediate School is continually striving to provide the best academic experience possible for all its students. To achieve this goal, we offer an academic program that includes: Advanced Math, Regents Science, Accelerated ESL, Accelerated English Language Arts and honors classes. Students can attend our comprehensive after school program that meets daily and offers one and one half hours of academic support and one and one half hours of sports and art. Students may participate in our subject specific and club after school programs as well.

### Special Academic Programs

Honors Program, Peer Tutoring Program, Remedial courses in ESL, reading and math.

### Extracurricular Activities

Our club program includes: Student government, Law, Dance, Computers, Photography, Yearbook and other programs. In addition, we have inter-scholastic basketball teams and an extensive intramural sports program. I.S. 125 houses a Champions Club - sports, arts and academic programs sponsored through a grant from the After School Corporation.





## TEACHERS


Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




