Principal's Statement

Marie Curie Middle School is home to 1,226 sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth graders of diverse ethnic backgrounds. The normal school day begins at 8:10 a.m. Our rigorous academic program provides sound educational courses for all students as well as acceleration classes for Grade 8 students in Science, Mathematics and Second Language. For the ninth grade, students study High School subject courses. The elective program includes major talent groups in Art, Vocal, Orchestra, Band and Dance. The school day is extended for enrichment and/or remediation before and after school in Math and Language Arts.

Special Academic Programs

The school has several Magnet and Special Progress classes in all grades for our gifted and talented students. Acceleration classes are also provided for students in Math and Science. The school provides enrichment and talent courses in Computers as well as Fine and Performing Arts.

Extracurricular Activities

The following extracurricular activities are provided for students: Basketball (girls and boys teams), Volleyball, Softball, Newspaper Club, Peer Tutoring, Yearbook Club, Dance, Chorus, Orchestra/Band, Musical Ensemble Group, Peer Mediation Club, Recycling and various other clubs and organizations.

Community Support

Middle School 158 is the home for two community based organizations, the Beacon Program and the TASC Program. The Beacon program is in its 12th year and the TASC program begins its fourth year. Both organizations provide after school programs and activities for students, community members and organizations.

Parents are essential members of our school family and are key members of our School Leadership Team and the School Safety committee. The PTA has organized fundraisers, sponsored before and afterschool activities, chaperoned dances and trips and have volunteered for many of our school events and activities.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




