Acknowledging student accomplishments is a common practice at PS 13. Parental participation is strongly encouraged through events, such as Breakfast with Daddy, and Writer's Celebrations. A traditional sense of community prevails through events like Flag Day, Dance Fete, and the Science Fair. School activities are supported by the PTA, SLT and the Instructional Team resulting in making PS 13 the "best it can be".

Special Academic Programs

Staff and students were involved in many successful programs that supported theme-based instruction: residencies funded through Project Arts, Project Create, COAHSI, ASP, Book of the Month Club, Writer's Celebrations, Value of the Month, and 100% Attendance Recognition. We are also installing a Weather Station designed to enrich all academic areas.

Extracurricular Activities

PS 13 had a great turnout during "Turn Off Your TV" week. Students were involved in Pajama Night and Harry Potter Night. The SLT organized a school dance for the fourth and fifth grades. 180 students were enrolled in our ASP. Our students were involved in the Fire Safety Program, Moveable Museum, Peaceful Playground and Project Create activities.

Community Support

We had numerous partnerships with CBOs such as SIMH Reading Volunteers, Snug Harbor, ABT ticket program, NYC Pops "Kids in the Balcony", Meals on Wheels' card program, Learning for Life, March of Dimes Walk, Penny Harvest, food collection for the needy, Martha Graham Dance, Museum of Natural History, NYFD Safety Program, and ACIM.

Parent/School Support

Our PTA holds monthly meetings as well as workshops on a variety of subjects. Our PC has implemented workshops with the NYCFD, Dignity Memorial's "Escape School", Kids Project, Health Plus, EPIC, Grandparent's breakfast with CASC and Math and Literacy workshops for parents. We sponsored a Daddy Donut Morning, and a morning of Arts and Crafts.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




