### Special Academic Programs

Content-area specialists offer a hands-on Science program, enrichment math and geography. Special academic programs include the Teachers' College Reading and Writing Project. The Arts are integrated throughout the curriculum. We have a music program that offers song flutes to 3rd grade and a band and strings program for 4th and 5th grades.

### Extracurricular Activities

After-school self sustaining programs include sports, arts and crafts, drama and chess. A Latchkey program is also available.

### Community Support

We have partnerships with the College of Staten Island, NYC Department of Cultural Affairs and Wagner College; and support from NYC School Volunteers. Volunteers from New York Cares and the local UAU also assisted in meeting the needs of our school. In addition, Arts Connection and Marquis Studios provide programs in visual arts and drama.






**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**




