Social Studies and Science are studied through an Independent Investigation Model.

United Activities Unlimited offers an after-school program for students. ESL for Adult Classes are taught twice a week to parents and caregivers sponsored by the Jewish Community Center. 




Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




