Principal's Statement

In keeping with our Mission Statement, we have set several goals/objectives for this school year: continued increased emphasis on the improvement of literacy skills (in particular reading, writing and listening); continued emphasis on enhancing our hands on/minds on, inquiry-based science program; the improvement of critical thinking skills to solve mathematics problems; increased emphasis on enhancing our pupils' ability to understand social studies concepts; integration of technology into the educational process; and arts-based learning and appreciation.

Special Academic Programs

Adult volunteers provide weekly one-on-one tutoring in reading. Reading incentive programs support learning throughout the year. All pupils (Grades K-5) participate in our "Book of the Month" (Read Aloud) activities. Recorder training is offered to all 2nd and 3rd graders, band to 4th and 5th graders.

Extracurricular Activities

Fifth grade club program includes: Arts and Crafts, Junior Teachers, Physical Fitness, and Performing Arts. Our After School Center includes: Basketball, Cheerleaders, Story/Arts and Crafts, Music, Crocheting and Desktop Publishing. Students participate in Student Government and related activities. Host of Summer Day Camp Program.

Community Support

We participate in "PENCIL's" Principal for a Day program. Student teachers/observers from Wagner College, St. John's University and the College of SI work with our classes. High school "Future Teachers" provide assistance in our classes. We support the community through our annual March of Dimes Mini-Walk.

Parent/School Support

Parents have an active association which supports our teachers and the children's programs, and keeps parents well informed through their monthly newsletter, "Adelaide," and general membership meetings. "Getting to Know P.S. 50" program is a welcome orientation for parents of incoming Kindergarten pupils. School calendar is distributed monthly.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




