### School Mission Statement

The instructional program enhances student intellectual, social and emotional growth. We have fully implemented the Regional initiatives of Balanced Literacy along with Readers' and Writers' Workshop. All of our grades use Everyday Math.*

### Principal's Statement

Public School 1 applied for and received grants from the Comprehensive School Reform and Reading for Excellence Act. With these funds we are instituting Core Knowledge throughout the school. Through the generosity of the Robin Hood Foundation, we have received a brand new state of the art library which has become the hub of literacy in the school.

### Special Academic Programs

Studio-in-the School Through LINC (Literacy Inc.) our students receive peer tutoring from A.E. Smith High School students. The Retired Seniors Volunteer Program (RSVP) provides individual literacy support to students in grades 1 and 2. We enjoyed the services of a Poet-In-Residence through Project Arts.

### Extracurricular Activities

We have partnered with Chess-in-the-Schools and our children participate in citywide tournaments. Our Chess team meets every Wednesday. Through Project Arts funding, we provide our students with recorder music instruction visual arts through Studio in the School and ballroom dancing.






**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**




