PS 25 has expanded its Middle School by adding 7th grade this year to its Pre K to 5th grades. Our goals are expanding as we expand. In addition, we are striving to develop a rigorous curriculum which includes "Understanding" concepts taught and practicing "HOTS", Higher Order Thinking Skills. Our Bilingual Programs now includes Dual Language classes from grades K to 4th. We are truly a bilingual, multicultural society striving to prepare our students for a multicultural world.

### Special Academic Programs

Grades K-3 are developing literacy skills through the use of Trophies which is available in English and Spanish. Grades 4-7 use a Balanced Literacy program using Teacher's College strategies and methodologies. Selected students are invited to after school and Saturdays Academy which provides Academic Interventions, Project Arts, and Title 3.

### Extracurricular Activities






**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**




