### School Mission Statement

### Principal's Statement

The Edgar Allan Poe Literacy Development School maintains literacy development as a unifying focus for the achievement of high standards by all students. Five literacy mini schools form the organizational structure of P.S. 46. Each literacy mini school has an administrative and instructional leadership team of assistant principal, guided reading teachers and a health aide. Students are grouped heterogeneously throughout all classes and the curriculum is enhanced by arts and technology integration. Teachers participate in on-site professional development opportunities supported by a professional development center and literacy and math coaches.

### Special Academic Programs

Our school's academic program is enhanced by the NCEE's America's Choice School Design for improvement in teaching the elements of Learning Standards in literacy, math and science. The "Arts are Literacy" theme promotes instruction in Art, Drama and Music by classroom teachers, art specialists and art consultants.

### Extracurricular Activities

Our students participate in After-School Clubs in visual arts, academic enrichment, drama, technology, math, science, and basketball. There is a strong focus on student leadership development through participation in the Student Council, School Safety Squad, Peer Mediators and Library Squad.

### Community Support

Robin Hood Foundation funds and supports the School Library; Councilman's RESO A Grants for two technology labs and mobile laptop carts; NY Botanical Garden Annual Family Health Walk; NY Post Student Achievement Scholarships; Educators for Social Responsibility in building a positive school environment.

### Parent/School Support

Parents participate in the School's Leadership Team holding co-chair status. The Parent Outreach Center serves as the hub for all parent literacy and math activities under the leadership of a full time Parent Coordinator. Learning Leaders train and support parent volunteers. Saturday classes for parents provides instruction in ESL and technology.






**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**

**Average Days Absent**




