School Mission Statement

It is our Mission to promote a learning environment that challenges our students and enables them to fulfill their full academic potential; preparing them for a successful transition to the secondary and high school levels. It is also our commitment to build a sense of community by working in collaboration with parents and local organizations to celebrate individual and cultural diversity of our students; fostering the development of a learning community poised to achieve success as they become responsible and productive citizens. Our school promotes the use and integration of science, math, and technology into daily instruction, thus preparing our students for life's constantly-evolving opportunities. Through our Arts & Journalism Academy for 5th and 6th grade students, students are challenged academically, and exposed to the various career opportunities within the fields of the Arts and Media.

Principal's Statement

P.S. 75 is a PreK-6 school. Our instructional programs for grades K-6 use an integrated approach during our 2 hour literacy block. Thus, our read aloud and monthly genre studies program (shared reading) integrates social studies and science. The 100 Book Challenge Program allows students to read independently daily for 45 minutes. Finally, Junior Great Books is used as a shared-inquiry during the literacy block where questions of fact, interpretation, and evaluation guide discussions in grades 2-6. The daily numeracy block consists of a daily 1 hour lesson plus 1/2 hour of enrichment.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




