School Mission Statement

Principal's Statement

P.S. 89 is a K - 8 school of 1450 students. We have a diverse student population which includes 300 ELL students, 300 Special Needs students and a wide ethnic mixture of other students. The school has made strong improvement in student ELA and Math performance in the past two years. In addition, we have added many new programs for our students such as Chess in the Schools, Broadway Juniors and the National Dance Institute program. There is a climate of confidence in the school that comes from a belief that our students will succeed. Nothing will stop us from making this a reality.

Special Academic Programs

Spanish is taught as a foreign language beginning in the upper elementary grades. Eighth graders can challenge the advanced Spanish proficiency examination. A Saturday ELL Academy is offered for immigrant students. There are many SES providers offering after school tutorial programs for our K - 8 student population.

Extracurricular Activities

A "Sports and Arts In the Schools" Program has provided additional sports activities for our students after school. An active after school intramural basketball program has fostered competition among neighboring public schools for boys and girls. A junior chorus has been started and a robotics club for our Middle Schoolers has also begun.

Community Support

Internships are offered to Eighth Graders in our Project Read tutoring program for our Grade K - 2 students. We also have a partnership with Roads to Success, a program that teaches our Middle Schoolers about career choices.

Parent/School Support

The principal working closely with our School Leadership Team and Parents Association fosters strong collaboration on many levels. Learning Leaders, Inc. assists in organizing parent volunteers. Workshops are offered to help parents participate more fully in their child's learning. An English-as-a-Second Language class is offered to parents.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




