School Mission Statement

The mission of Middle School 113 at the Richard R. Green Educational Complex is to create an environment that focuses on the interests, abilities and talents of all students in its domain. The staff and parents are committed to providing students with a challenging curriculum that is rigorous, innovative, and focused on addressing the New York State content and performance Standards. It is the intention of Middle School 113 to ensure that all students are academically and technologically prepared to meet the challenges of the 21st century. Students will prepare themselves to be successful in High School and set their sights toward higher education. Our immediate mission is to successfully phase Middle School 113 out of the Richard R. Green Educational complex by assisting the three small schools as they phase into the Richard R. Green Educational Complex.

Principal's Statement

Middle School 113 students proudly wear the colors of the school dress code, which is policy. We use an academy team approach where teachers and classes form collaborative communities, named after Ivy League colleges. The core curriculum is evident and each subject is aligned with the NYS/NYC learning standards with the "principles of learning" as a basis. Teachers participate in weekly professional development and common planning sessions. Administrators, lead teachers, Princeton Review and Knowledge Project consultants provide academic support, utilizing the point of entry model as well as balanced literacy and balanced math.

Special Academic Programs

ELA and Math skill focuses of the week guide instruction, during the 90 minute block. We offer bilingual education, a math regents program, and foreign language. Journalism and videography are offered by The Knowledge Project; dance, drama and youth development from Salaam Arts and Inspirations.

Extracurricular Activities

MS 113 has an 8th grade Saturday Test Prep Academy as well as an afterschool program. The Discovery Program provides after school instruction. The Steel Pan company teaches steel band and Salaam Arts and Inspiration teaches leadership via "Girls Spirit". "Inside Broadway" provides drama, singing and dancing for those who are artistically inclined.

Community Support

The Beacon Program is prominent throughout our school, providing academic and recreational services for the entire community.

Parent/School Support

Our Parent Coordinator offers workshops and assistance. The PA provides trips, etc. The phone master system calls homes via the telephone. Our Weekly Bulletin and Monthly Calendar inform parents of issues and important dates. The School Leadership Team helps set policies. TKP's bi-weekly student newsletter informs with parents of school issues.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




