The educational program at M.S. 166 is based on the belief that we can produce responsible young citizens by providing educational experiences in academic, artistic, social, and technological areas. The school is equipped with a state-of-the-art mobile technology Lab to facilitate advancement into the 21st century. The school is comprised of three academies: the Science-Technology Academy, the Urban Community Leadership Academy, and the High School Preparation Academy. The administration, faculty, and staff support the school by giving not only their professional time, but also their personal time to expand educational opportunities for all students.

Special Academic Programs

MS 166 has specialized programs that include Balanced Literacy, Balanced Math, Wireless Technology, Academic Intervention Services (AIS), Peer Tutoring (Arista). We also have partnerships that foster professional development with Bank Street College (BETLA & Principal's Institute), Teach for America, Teaching Fellows, and AUSSIE consultants.

Extracurricular Activities

M.S. 166 has extended day activities that include morning tutoring (Zero Period), Advantage After School Program, Academic Intervention Services (AIS), Children's Aid Society, National Junior Honor Society (ARISTA), Student Government, WoodyCrest Center, Kaplan tutoring, BELL Learning, Sports Program, PAL, Project ARTS, and Project SCALES.

Community Support

M.S. 166 has affiliations with the following organizations: Neighborhood Partners Initiative, Children's Aid Society, Helen Keller-Child Sight, Project Club Clemente, Washington Mutual, Bronx D.A. Mock Trial Program, Woodycrest, Bronx Community College, Columbia University, Dept. of Health, SPINS Program, and Toys for Tots.






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




