An additional 90 minute Literacy Block has been added to our integrated curriculum. Our curriculum consists of Mathematics, Science, English, Foreign Language, Social Studies, Art, Music, Technology, Health, Physical Education and ESL (English as a Second Language).






Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School

Average Days Absent




