#### School Mission Statement

#### Principal's Statement

At FLHMS, our aim is to prepare students for a meaningful life so they can think critically and act compassionately to build a better world. Small class size and longer classes allow teachers to know students well. Parents are kept informed about their child's progress via phone calls, letters, and family conferences.

Our school is safe because our goal is for every member of our community to learn how to resolve their conflicts peacefully.

We have high expectations of all our students. To graduate from FLH, every student is expected demonstrate their learning through projects and portfolios.

#### Special Academic Programs

The 6th grade has focus on Literacy and Math across the curriculum. The 7th and 8th grade, students have classes of Humanities and Math/Science and Advisory. All student must complete academic Portfolios orally and in writing every year in order to move up to the next grade.

#### Extracurricular Activities

Children's Aid Society works closely with Fannie Lou Hamer Middle School. They provide daily after school program that is academic and recreational. In addition, each weekend all students are invited to an "Honor the Game" basketball program. Seasonal events involving music and community celebrations are also arranged.

#### Community Support

FLHMS opened with the support of Fannie Lou Hamer Freedom High School and is an Empowerment Zone school. FLHMS also works with Bard College, Sarah Lawrence College and Teacher's College to provide student teachers with placement. In addition, FLHMS has been supported by Teaching Fellows and Teach For America.

#### Parent/School Support

Monthly PA meetings are arranged on topics such as: Transition to High School, Summer Camp, Science and Technology. In addition, FLHMS works with Learning Leaders to provide training to parents on supporting their children in academics. We also work with Planned Parenthood to provide training on health and human relationships.






**Percent More Than Two Years Teaching in This School**
