One of the key goals of District 75 is to develop and expand options where students can succeed in the least restrictive environment. Schools receive additional credit for contributing to this goal by placing students in classes that are not only successful, but also are as close to general education as possible (which is measured by this section). Another key goal of District 75 is to create safe learning environments with positive behavior supports. Schools are recognized for maintaining a low rate of serious disciplinary infractions as defined by Levels 4 and 5 of the citywide Standards of Intervention and Discipline Measures. A school earns full additional credit when its metric value is in the top 20% of D75 schools citywide. It earns half credit when its metric value is in the top 40%. Additional Credit can only improve a school's Progress Report score. It cannot lower a school's score. D75 schools are eligible for 3 closing the achievement gap additional credit metrics, each of which is worth up to 3 points. (In the table below, "." indicates that a school has fewer than 15 eligible students in a category.)





**SPECIAL RECOGNITION**



The Peer Index is used to sort schools on the basis of demographics. For District 75 Schools, peer schools are determined based on grade ranges served. District 75 schools are divided into three peer groups according to the proportion of the school's students who are identified as grade level K-5. Schools are classified as elementary (mostly students in grades K to 5); middle (mostly students in grades 6 to 8); or K-8 (students evenly distributed across grades K to 8).



The Progress Report for elementary and middle schools focuses on students' growth to proficiency and beyond, regardless of their starting point. The Progress Report measures individual students' growth on state English and Math tests using growth percentiles.

### 1 GROWTH PERCENTILES

A student's growth percentile compares his or her growth to the growth of all students in the City who started at the same level of proficiency the year before. A student's growth percentile is a number between 0 and 100, which represents the percentage of students with the same score on last year's test who scored the same or lower than the student on this year's test. For example, a student with a growth percentile of 84 earned a score on this year's test that was the same or higher than 84 percent of the students in the City who had the same score as he did last year.



### 2 ADJUSTED GROWTH PERCENTILES

To evaluate a school on its students' growth percentiles, the Progress Report uses an adjusted growth percentile. Growth percentile adjustments are based on students' demographic characteristics, and reflect average differences in growth compared to students with the same starting proficiency level. The adjustments are made to students' ending proficiency rating as follows:

Note: special education program for purposes of adjustments is based on the most restrictive setting of students over the last four school years.

### 3 MEDIAN ADJUSTED GROWTH PERCENTILES

The Progress Report evaluates a school based on its median adjusted growth percentile, the adjusted growth percentile of the middle student when all the students' adjusted growth percentiles are listed from lowest to highest.
