

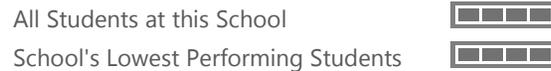

How well did this school help students improve on their State English tests?






