



School Overview

In partnership with the New York City Mission Society, Bronx Community High School (BCHS) is a small transfer school designed for young people who have been truant or dropped out of school. BCHS is designed to provide intensive support and services to students to ensure continued attendance in school. Each student is assigned an advisor throughout his/her time at our school. Each advisor works with no more than 25 students. BCHS has an accelerated credit program so that students will have the opportunity to earn additional credits. Students graduate with post-graduation plans and participate in employment readiness and skills development while enrolled in school.






