New York State Guidelines and Requirements for Arts Education

The New York State Education Department (NYSED) has specific guidelines and requirements for arts instruction.

At the elementary level, in grades PreK-6, students should receive instruction in dance, music, theater, and visual arts. In addition, NYSED recommends that students spend a specific allocation of hours learning in the arts.

At the middle school level, in grades 7 and 8, the NYSED expects that students achieve, by the end of grade 8 one half-unit in dance, music, theater, or visual arts, and second half-unit in a second arts discipline.

At the high school level, the NYSED requires that all students graduate having taken at least two credits in the arts (dance, music, theater, and/or visual arts).

School's Arts Program Description

This school has submitted the following description of its arts program:

The High School of Art and Design has been a commercial art high school since 1936. The curriculum is developed with our industry partners and Post-secondary educational partners. We prepare students for careers in the arts. Our students receive two periods of art instruction daily for all 4 years they attend our school. Most programs are NYS approved CTE programs. Included are architectural design, cartooning, animation, graphic design, illustration, digital photography, film and video, and fashion design. Students learn the Adobe and AutoCAD software programs and become certified in both programs. Our facilities mirror the state of the art equipment used in industry. Our students participate in internships available through industry partners and various arts organizations. They compete in art competitions and display their artwork both in school and in outside venues. Our graduating students are accepted into all the major colleges and universities throughout the country.


