### **SAFE SCHOOLS INITIATIVE**

#### **Summary**

This allocation provides funds for professional development and direct services to students to achieve improved student behavior so that each school provides a safe and supportive environment in which students can achieve academic success.

#### **Purpose**

The goal of the Safe Schools Initiative is to reduce discipline incidents and increase school safety by providing professional development to help school personnel improve school culture and environment and direct services to students to develop conflict resolution skills.

**SUBJECT: SAFE SCHOOLS INITIATIVE – TITLE IV ROLLOVER**

The NYC Department of Education Office of School and Youth Development (OSYD) will support a cadre of high need schools to achieve improved student behavioral outcomes so that each school provides a safe and supportive environment in which students can achieve academic success. Schools will be identified for support based on the following criteria:

- schools identified as persistently dangerous;
- schools designated as Impact schools;
- schools that may be identified as potentially dangerous based on a review of 2006-2007 school incident data;
- schools that are high need based on a review of 2006-2007 school incident data and current 2007-2008 trends

Identified schools will receive services and/or funds for professional development and direct services to students. Professional development is expected to build the capacity of school personnel to sustain long term improved school tone and culture beyond the time frame of this initiative. Direct services to students may be provided by external community-based organization partners or internal school staff for social/emotional learning to build their capacity to use conflict resolution skills, manages anger, establish and maintain positive relations with peers and adults, and respect diversity and eschew aggressive and violent behaviors. Program designs will be developed at the respective schools in partnership with the Office of School and Youth Development.

Allocations are provided on the attached tables. Funds directly allocated to a school's budget will be placed in the "TITLE IV SAFE SCHOOL" or "TITLE IV SAFE SCHOOL CW" allocation category. Schools should schedule their allotment in accordance with their approved program proposal. Funds allocated to ISCs will be placed in the "TITLE IV SAFE SCHOOL TU" or "TITLE IV SAFE SCHOOL TU CW" allocation category.
