SUBJECT: Safe Schools Initiative

The Office of Safety and Youth Development (OSYD) will support a cadre of high need schools to achieve improved student behavioral outcomes so that each school provides a safe and supportive environment in which students can achieve academic success.

Schools were identified for support based on the following criteria:

- ❖ *schools designated as Persistently Dangerous;*
- ❖ *schools designated as Impact;*
- ❖ *schools that are high need based on a review of 2012-2013 and 2013-2014 incident data; and current 2014-2015 trends; and*
- ❖ *schools identified as in need for prevention and/or intervention measures.*

The identified schools are receiving funds for professional development and direct student services. Professional development is expected to build the capacity of school personnel to sustain long-term improved school tone and culture beyond the time frame of this initiative. In particular, schools that participated in restorative approaches training during the summer of 2014 are receiving funds for on-site coaching and support to staff members implementing restorative circles.

Direct services to students will be provided by external community-based organization partners who will supervise social work interns. The social workers will support student academic progress, emotional wellness, and organizational skills by connecting young people with mental health clinical supports, tutoring, positive young adult role models, supported internships, employment opportunities, and non-stigmatizing family-level interventions.

Program designs will be developed at the respective schools in partnership with OSYD and then submitted for approval. Designs for professional development will be approved by Jolan Nagi and for direct services by Joshua Laub.

In addition, District 60 will receive \$77,672 to support schools with capacity building professional development to implement restorative approaches, including follow up school-based coaching and implementation. The sessions are scheduled either after-school or on Saturdays. The D60 allocation covers the cost of purchasing professional development services from contracted vendor(s) and compensating the school-based staff for participating in the training, in accordance with collective bargaining agreements.

Tax Levy funds directly allocated to a school's budget will be placed in the **TL SAFE SCHOOL** allocation category. Schools should schedule their allotment in accordance with their approved program proposal.
